It was only referred to as a current rumour, and in justice to Mr. Muir, I accept his assurance that he had not heard it.

McAvity, Riverside Golf Club, St. John is the Maritime Amateur Golf champion for 1927, defeating F. R. Risten, Fredericton, 5 up and 4 to go today on the Woodstock course where the fiftieth annual meet of the Maritime Provinces Golf Association took place. The new champion is just nineteen years old.

The same can easily be said of the Ministers of our Province, and the vast temperance working forces against liquor evil whom this gem of purity dares to brand as an "unholy alliance" and "organized hypocrisy." For one I do not intend to allow him to get away with such wholesale slander with impunity.

When he talks of the community

of "bootleggers, smugglers and rum-runners," he may be at home on his subject—or he may not. If he talks from personal knowledge then he broadcasts what he knows to be untrue. If on the other hand he talks from hearsay he gives currency to unfounded slander in abject ignorance of what he talks about.

Mr. Muir says I attempted to raise a prejudice against him

by reason of his being "not an Islander but a recent importation." He has misrepresented my purpose which was not to "prejudice" him, but to protest against the "stigma of reproach," and to point out that it was none of my Island "nativity" that thus attempted to foul our nest.

I cannot do better in closing

than to quote from "The Bellman," in the Chronicle, the subject of Mr. Muir's first attack:— Of course, as is ever the case, individual clergymen were found ready to bless the enemy of civilization, and to consider their brethren, who are fighting for health and home, for fathers and brothers, for wives and children, to be the company of the workers of iniquity. Well, we should not be surprised or complain. Clerical apologists were found for the slave traffic, and for other iniquities which have cursed humanity.
