A hearty demonstration was given last week by the people of Elmira and vicinity in honor of their federal representative J. J. Hughes and in recognition of his services in securing the Elmira branch railway. A special train from Souris conveyed a large number of people of both political parties over the branch to Elmira station. As Mr. Hughes alighted from the train, he was greeted with three rousing cheers and a tiger. After order was restored, J. F. Morrow read a carefully worded and complimentary address to Mr. Hughes, formally thanking him for the great boon he had been instrumental in securing for the people of the section served by the Elmira branch and detailing the history of the movement that led to its construction. Mr. Hughes made a characteristic reply, thanking the people for their kind expressions of appreciation and promising to serve them as faithfully in the future as in the past. The party were afterwards entertained at the home of M. J. Campbell. A resolution was adopted asking that a train be placed on the Elmira branch, connecting at Harmony with the morning train from Souris, proceeding to Souris and returning in the evening, connecting with the afternoon train from Charlottetown at Harmony and then proceeding to Elmira.

In an interview with Premier Matheson last night the Guardian learned that the Government had under consideration for some time the providing of better and cheaper facilities of procuring mussel-mud from St. Peter's Bay. The deposits in this bay are numerous. In some parts the beds are forty feet in depth, the top being bare at low tides. The department of railways has been requested to provide a sunk siding on the margin of the bay, with an overhead roadway or bridge, which will enable the mud to be discharged from the cars thus saving the great and costly labor of shoveling the mud from the track level. Mr. McGrath the Dominion engineer, Mr. Shaw local engineer together with Premier Matheson, the Hon. Murdoch McKinnon, Hon. Charles Dalton, H. D. McEwen, Father McIntyre and Sylvan Gallant, M. P. F., who went from Charlottetown by special train spent yesterday examining various sites. It is understood that the engineers decided that the siding will be placed at Marie Station and it is hoped that the work of construction may be carried out before the opening of winter. The saving in the cost of labor should reduce the price to a point which will enable farmers to use this splendid fertilizer in much larger quantities than they have heretofore been able to do. This is but the first step towards a large development of this important industry. It is confidently expected that in the near future, it will be possible to deliver mussel-mud at about half of the present prices. The reduction in the first year cannot be so great as this, but the advantages to all concerned in this industry will it is hoped be very considerable from the outset. It is intended also that this same benefit will be extended to other parts of the Island and that while supplying farmers with what they may require, it will also be the means of providing material for building up new oyster beds.

The funeral of the late Miss Gladys Reddin, Charlottetown, took place at 1:40 o'clock yesterday morning from the residence of her parents "Brighton Lodge," to St. Dunstan's Cathedral. There was an unusually large attendance of representative citizens. The pall-bearers were George DeBlois, Roy Fitzgerald, Gerald Bremner, Hal-Burke, V. M. Blake, and W. T. Wellener. At the Cathedral, where a large congregation had assembled a High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Rev. Pius McDonald, with Rev. Dr. McLellan, in the Sanctuary and Rev. Maurice McDonald in the Choir. The Choir was led by Judge Blanchard with Mrs. Byron Brown presiding at the organ. At the conclusion of the service at the Cathedral, the procession reformed and proceeded to the Roman Catholic Cemetery, where the body was laid to rest. The funeral was another evidence of the respect of the community for the bereaved parents and family, and affection for the late Gladys Reddin.

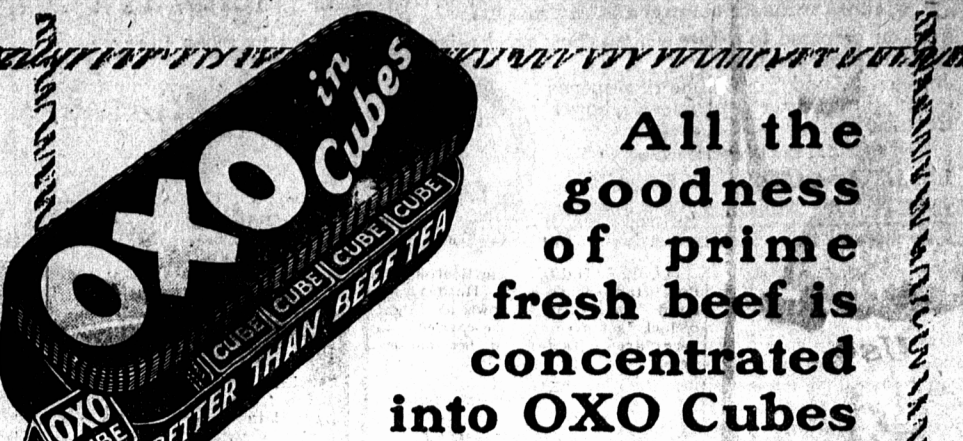
If a satisfactory explanation is not forthcoming he will call for a congressional investigation when congress convenes.
