REVIEWS ECONOMIC DECLINE—Hugh Paton of Charlottetown reviewed the economic decline of the island at a meeting at St. Peter's Church Hall in Charlottetown last night. Canon E. M. Motone presided. After Mr. Paton's speech a round table conference was held on the same subject. Those taking part included R. L. Cotton, chairman, C. M. Shannon, Capt. Eric H. Ings, Major T. E. MacNutt, Lieut.-Col. K. S. Rogers and Chester Aorn. It was revealed at the meeting that the total export sales from this province dropped from \$32,000,000 in 1929 to \$18,000,000 in the 1939. The only industry to show an increase in the last 10 years was the tourist industry. Also discussed at the round table conference was the possibility of expanding markets for canned potatoes and other vegetables. Mr. Paton and Lieut.-Col. Rogers are members of the Prince Edward Island development and research council which is seeking ways and means to expand the province's industries.

SPRING THANKOFFERING—The Spring Thankoffering meeting of the Evening Auxiliary was held last evening in Heartz Hall, with Mrs. Hugh Miller presiding. Several of the organizations of the church took part in the program. Mrs. Lewis Murray read the scripture lesson. The choir of the Girl Guides, winners of the inter-group contest, sang a hymn. Miss Jean Bevan, who is the only Guide in P. E. I. to earn the gold cord, read a paper on "The Relationship of the Guides to the Church." Two messages were beautifully rendered by the Chamainde Chorus. Mr. Lawrence Toombs, a member of the Young People's Union, gave a most interesting and instructive address on "India." He traced the influence on the people of the country, described the present political situation, and closed with a survey of the work of Christian missions in India.

AWARDED CONTRACT—Mr. A. T. McKinnon has been awarded the contract for the building of a separate power house and heating plant at the Sanatorium. It was reported yesterday.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY, April 10th, 1940.

When the House met at 3:15 p. m. Mr. McPhee asked the Premier for the answer to Question 43, which was:

"Were any bills paid in the year 1939 for accounts contracted or for which liability was incurred prior to that year?" and "If the answer is in the affirmative, what addresses of persons to whom payments were made with the amount paid and the nature of the account or liability in each case?"

Mr. McKinnon said it would require two weeks work on the part of an audit department to prepare the answer.

The House went into Committee on a bill intituled "The Amusement Tax Act," with Mr. Amear in the chair. The bill, which consolidates existing legislation, was reported agreed to without amendment.

The House went into Committee on "An Act to Amend the Credit Union Societies Act," with Mr. MacLaren in the chair.

Mr. McKinnon explained that the amendment was for the purpose of changing the ending of the fiscal year to the thirtieth day of November in order to have the annual meeting in October of each year.

The bill was agreed to without amendment.

The House went into Committee on "An Act to Regulate the Sale and Installation of Lightning Rods" with Mr. McLean in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

The House went into Committee on "An Act Respecting the Prince Edward Island Women's Institute," with Mr. Stewart in the chair. It was agreed to without amendment.

The House went into Committee on "An Act Respecting the Controverted Election of Members of the Legislative Assembly," with Mr. Foley in the chair.

Premier Campbell explained that the Act had not been amended since 1911.

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

The House went into Committee on "The Drainage Act," with Mr. Barbour in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

The House went into Committee on "An Act Respecting Companies Domestically or Having Security Registered in the Province of Prince Edward Island" with Mr. Motone in the chair. The bill was agreed to without amendment.

The House went into Committee on "The Public Health Act" with Mr. Saville in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to with amendments.

The House went into Committee on "An Act Respecting the Legislative Assembly," with Mr. Robinson in the chair.

The Premier explained that the bill was a consolidation of seven Acts of the Legislature which dealt with the duties of the various Councils and the Treasury Board in the Act he said.

On the motion of Mr. Campbell the meeting of the Assembly was adjourned from ten to six o'clock. Progress continued. The payroll for the men is \$50,000 a year. Fuel amounts to an expenditure of \$44,000, he added. He explained that 80 per cent of the expenditures of the company were made in the province, and this amounts to \$140,000 a year, he disclosed.

Pick-up And Delivery Up For Discussion

The Charlottetown Board of Trade are in receipt of a communication from the City truckmen protesting against the Canadian National Railway's pick-up and delivery recently inaugurated here. It was revealed at the quarterly meeting of the Board last night.

The committee on transportation, headed by Mr. W. S. Grant as chairman, have taken the matter up and will confer with the City Council on the subject. It was announced a similar protest was sent to the Council by the truckmen of St. John's.

Mr. J. M. Murley, President of the Board, occupied the chair and the special speakers were, Mr. V. A. Ainsworth, Manager of the Maritime Electric Co., and Mr. Ted Chandler, Provincial Electrical Inspector.

During the reading of the communications by the Secretary of the St. Lawrence Waterways project was introduced but on motion was not read. The letter was placed on file. Mr. R. E. Mulch, St. Lawrence Waterways project, might prove to be a disadvantage of the Maritime Provinces.

He suggested that the matter be given further consideration and if possible the viewpoint of the other Maritime Provinces be obtained.

A communication from the Maritime Transportation Commission announced the new Trans Canada service and specified the rates on express which would be in effect. These rates show a substantial decrease over the previous charges between Charlottetown and the mainland.

A reply to a letter from the Secretary of the Board was received from the City of Saint John which explained the operation of the pick-up and delivery trucks there and declared that there was much opposition to the service when it was first used.

The letter also stated that if found to be unsatisfactory the service would be discontinued but maintained that the trucks did not interfere with the truckmen to any great extent as it only handled freight for Maritime ports.

The Secretary read a letter from the Maritime Transportation Commission which was addressed to Mr. R. E. Mulch, which declared that Mr. Mulch and Mr. J. O. Hyndman had objected to the inauguration of the pick-up and delivery in this Province but reason that the service was started here was to give the same service as was given to the mainland. This was the objective of the Commission, the letter disclosed.

Mr. F. W. Hyndman reported for the membership Committee and stressed the need of increasing the membership of the Board.

Mr. V. A. Ainsworth speaking on the physical aspects of the electrical business said that in this Province the need of increasing the membership of the Board.

The company in older days was financed by United States money, at present it is mostly financed by Nova Scotia money, he said.

Utility companies cannot turn their capital over more than once in five years, he explained.

Half of the investment of \$1,250,000 is in the power house, the remainder is in the lines, he continued.
