—FIRST HERRING.—The first herring of the season to be caught in Summerside Harbour were taken yesterday morning. The catches were small but as conditions improve there should be some good hauls made.

—ROADS IMPROVING.—The roads are improving every day now and within a week should be well dried up. Farmers are coming to town with single and double teams and can make very good time. There is still some snow in places.

—FIRST STEAMER.—The first water craft to enter Summerside this season was a big freight steamer which came in yesterday to avoid the heavy ice in the strait. She will remain until conditions are more favorable.

the experience of such an expert. Later meetings of the Board dealt largely with shipping and freight arrangements, and at the meeting in July 1927 it was reported that the total membership of the Board was 145 as against 113 for the year 1887. Of the 113 members registered on April 26th, 1887 there were twenty-nine still alive. Sixteen in Charlottetown who are not now members, nine others scattered throughout the states of the Dominion, and the following who were still on the roll: Messrs. W. H. Aitken, G. H. Taylor, John McLean and James Patton.

In connection Mr. Patton said that he thought that the Board of Trade had justified its forty years existence, and that if it continued to carry on its operations with the same spirit and the breadth of outlook the next forty years should show a record of even greater accomplishments than in the past which he had reviewed.

In introducing Mr. Tanner, the chairman called the attention of the gathering to the presence of Mr. John E. Sinclair, M. P., who came to the meeting in response to an invitation from the Board asking his attendance to discuss with the Council of the Board and the shippers, possibilities of improvements in wharf-shipping facilities and Mr. Cotton said he expressed the wish of not only himself but also of the Board, to have Mr. Sinclair address the gathering.

Mr. Sinclair in speaking briefly expressed his appreciation of the kind words of the President in regard to himself and his colleague, Mr. Jenkins. He was very much pleased to be present at the Fortieth Anniversary of the Board.

There was every reason to expect a great future for Prince Edward Island, and he little things that did not seem to be forgotten and attention paid to the bigger things.

He assured the Board of Trade that he was always willing to sit down and discuss with the Council, and means to further the interests of the Province and to do the best to have the powers and proposals carried out.

Mr. Tanner, in the course of his address on the possibilities of the extension of Prince Edward Island Fisheries, first expressed his appreciation of having the privilege to speak before the Charlottetown Board of Trade. He was pleased to have the acquaintance of Mr. Sinclair and Mr. Jenkins as his representatives in Ottawa.

In speaking of fisheries, Mr. Tanner said that Nova Scotia has conducted fishing on a more extensive scale than Prince Edward Island and it has a larger number of fishermen to exploit and a larger number of vessels.

In Prince Edward Island, out of a total revenue of about \$1,500,000 yearly, there are four outstanding varieties contributing to this revenue. The lobster comes first then the cod, next salmon and the herring and doysters are far behind.

In suggesting improvements, he said that the value of the fish and the desires of the house wife must be borne in mind. The fisheries on the Atlantic Coast have in the past lagged. The standards of our fishermen, are yet being followed. The question of waste in production is a waste in great quantities should be utilized and made to pay their own production. There is great waste in the lobster industry. To utilize everything should be the case in all varieties of fish. He often wondered, he said, why Prince Edward Island has not developed along these lines, to the extent to which it has developed in the fish industry. He showed how the Province is losing a large amount of profit in not producing the by-product of the lobster industry—tomalley or lobster butter. A product which sells in England at 90 shillings per case. The shells of lobster he thought could also be put to use. But, he says, he cannot carry on to a great extent as there is the danger of over fishing.

The greatest development in the future lies in the canning industry. A phase which this Province has been neglecting and into which it has not ventured. The value of canned products is more than that of the greater bulk of green galled, and 1924 Nova Scotia canned 975 cases of cod and 4300 cases of haddock. In 1925 1906 cases of cod and 5500 cases of haddock were canned. Last year the province of Nova Scotia canned 23,085 cases of cod and 14,800 cases of haddock. This, he said, is an indication of the development in canned goods. He thought the Prince Edward Island cod should be canned instead of being dried or green-salted. It would create a big market and a profitable industry.

Mr. Tanner stressed the necessity of quality. Only goods of the highest quality should be put on the market. If this Province could create a Prince Edward Island
