SUMMERSIDE harbor is still blocked by the ice bridge at the entrance, and although the harbor and Strait are almost clear of ice, and navigable for all classes of vessels, our merchants are obliged to pay extra freight by other routes, put up with the loss and inconvenience of delay, while a dozen or more schooners are lying idle by the wharves. It is said by those who are in a position to know that the Stanley could cut through the bridge without any difficulty whatever, and that as a result the harbor would be clear of ice within twenty four hours. Through the chairman of the Town Council this matter was brought to the notice of the Department of Marine Wednesday morning, but so far nothing has come of it. Summerside has some magnificent individual kickers,—men who, when the interests of the town are being neglected can strike an attitude at a street corner, or on some one's counter and harangue by the hour on the subject of general grievance, but outside of the temporary admiration excited, the harangue bears no fruit. What Summerside has long needed is a Board of Trade or some similar institution, which will be in a position to advocate in a representative way the town's just claims, and which can kick judiciously when occasion demands it. Such a body—composed of business men in touch with local requirements could with united effort present their claims in a manner that the powers could not afford to ignore, and such a condition as exists at present—a harbor allowed to remain blocked through criminal neglect—would not be liable to occur more than once. Summerside should wake up at once and look to its interests.
