SCHOOL HOLIDAY.—The city schools are closed to-day in honour of the King's birthday.

THE PICTURE BOAT.—The Northumberland docked at Charlottetown last evening at 7.50 o'clock.

NEW SIDEWALK.—A new plank sidewalk is being laid down on Cumberland Street, between Kent and Fitzroy Streets.

A GOOD LITTER.—Mr. Cephas Mallet, Manager of the Beach Hill Fox Co., was in the city yesterday. He reports having 23 pups in 6 litters. This is a patch company, and among the 23 pups are 9 handsome black. These foxes were supplied to the Company by the Canada Fox Exchange and Investment Co. a year or two ago.

TO-DAY'S RACES.—A good afternoon's racing is looked forward to to-day, and if the entries indicate anything, there will be keenly contested engagements. All the classes are well filled, a few familiar names being in the list. SUMMER STEAMERS.—Arrangements have been completed whereby the Red Cross steamers will make regular calls at Charlottetown en route from New York to St. Johns, Nfld. The first call will be by the Florizel, about the 13th. The next will be the Stephano, about a week later. The intention is to have regular weekly calls after September 15th. In the meantime there will be two sailings a month. The steamers are large, splendidly fitted out for both passenger and freight traffic, and their regular visits here will no doubt help swell the stream of summer travel this season.

OVERSEAS TOBACCO FUND.—Mr. H. W. Vinnicombe has at present about \$11.50 on hand for the above fund and will be pleased to receive any other amounts forwarded. The following notes received from those who got a supply of the tobacco, etc., sent for Christmas, speak for themselves as to appreciation. Any amount from 25c. up is acceptable. Dr. Jack J. McKenna, No. 42165, 10th Baitery, 3 Brigade, C. P. A., writes: "We have received the parcel of cigarettes you so generously sent, and we unite in heartily thanking you for your kind thoughtfulness. There is no present that could be more appreciated than a good smoke under these conditions. Signed on behalf of all the boys," Bomb. Geo. A. Clark, C. P. A., writes from Burma: "Many thanks for valuable present which I have just received. Such things are very scarce in this country at present. Cigarettes are our best friends now. Again thanking you, etc."

MISSIONARY ADDRESS.—At the St. James' prayer meeting last evening Miss McCully, a returned missionary from Korea, was present, accompanied by Mr. Cho, a native Christian who, after an "introduction" by the Chairman, Rev. D. McLean, gave a most interesting address in his native tongue, interpreted by Miss McQuay. He concluded his address in English. It was a strong appeal direct from Korea and was thoroughly enjoyed by the goodly audience present. Miss McCully in her pleasant and fluent manner told of the great good already accomplished during the past thirty years in Korea and made a strong appeal for the future work which is so pressing at the present time. Mr. Cho has been in Dalhousie for the past year getting an education which will enable him to return to his native land and preach the gospel to his people, and is accompanying Miss McCully on a tour through this province so that those interested may receive a message direct from the Korean Mission Field.

FUTURE OF FOX PELTS.—Mr. J. O. Hyndman has received an interesting letter from the Editor of Canada, the best-known and leading English journal dealing with all Canadian matters, in which he makes the following reference to the value of fox pelts: "I note your remarks re the pelt for which you were offered \$1,700.00. This strikes me as a very big price. I was discussing the whole business a week or two ago with one of the largest fur brokers in London and I was agreeably surprised when he expressed the opinion that even when the industry came down to a pelt basis, and the large number of pelts that would be available were thrown on the market, he did not think the price would be reduced more than 15 or 25 per cent. You can easily see that even on these figures the industry should prove immensely profitable." The Editor of Canada is not directly or indirectly interested in any fox company. He is a London Journalist, and as such has made it his duty to investigate the potentialities of the industry. He went to the fountain head, namely—a leading fur dealer, and as a result of his inquiries he is satisfied that the future of the fox industry on a pelt basis is amply assured. A 15 or 25 per cent. reduction on the high price now prevailing for silver pelts would mean, at the most, in the case of such a pelt as Mr. Hyndman had to offer, that he would obtain about \$1,275 instead of \$1,700.


