### BIG STRIKE.

**30,000 Minors go out and a Coal Famine may Result.**

PTTSBURG, Pa., April 4, 1900.—Between 25,000 and 30,000 coal miners in the Pittsburg district struck today, and 10,000 more are expected to go out tomorrow. A coal famine in the South will result if the strike is prolonged until after the spring rises in the river have ceased.

About half the men do not know why they quit. The other half want a plain interpretation of some of the provisions of the new wage scale, which went into effect yesterday.

Several mines have been made idle by drivers and outside laborers, who assert that an attempt is being made to apply the scale to their detriment. Monongahela river drivers demand \$2.40 a day, but declare the operators are endeavoring to give them \$2.10, the rate at the railroad mines.

President Dolan of the Miners' Union did not expect the strike, and spent the day trying to end it.

At Horatio and Anita miners refused to go to work to-day under the advanced scale, insisting that the Berwing White Company must first agree to collect check weighmen's wages through the office. The men operating the pump at Anita mines have quit work, and the mines are being flooded.
