NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—A London news agency dispatch to the New York Sun says:

"Bulgaria and Turkey are badly in need of help from Germany and Austria, because of the entry of Romania into the war. That is why Enver Pasha, Turkish minister of war, and King Ferdinand of Bulgaria are commencing at headquarters on the eastern front, according to a dispatch from the correspondent of the Daily Express at Geneva, who bases his message upon Budapest despatches."

These despatches say that Enver and King Ferdinand pointed out to the German and Austrian leaders that if Bulgaria were attacked on the north by a large Russo-Romanian army, she would be forced to evacuate Greece-

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## TO KEEP ENEMIES FROM ENTERING INDIA UNDER GUISE OF MISSIONARIES

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—The India office in London has notified the government that owing to circumstances arising out of the war persons other than British subjects who are desirous of proceeding to India to undertake missionary or educational work are now required to obtain permission from the India authorities to enable them to enter in such work.

"Experience has shown" says the communication, "that some safeguards are necessary to ensure that individuals desiring to work as missionaries in India are not in active sympathy with the enemies of the British Empire or lacking in goodwill towards the god of the country in which they propose to teach."
