## EMERALD J. WINNER OF SATURDAY'S RACE

Hundreds Witnessed the Exciting Yacht Race Saturday, the First for the H. V. Buntain Trophy.

Saturday was an ideal yachting day from the spectators' standpoint and naturally a large crowd of people viewed the first race for the H. V. Buntain trophy, which was contested over the double triangular course in the Charlottetown harbor Saturday afternoon. Eleven yachts being entered in the race, and all finishing in good time. The various wharves were crowded with sightseers and there were motor boats galore in the harbor. That the interest in yachting sports is being fully revived in Charlottetown none could doubt from the enthusiastic cheering which greeted the contestants. This cheering certainly added pep to the race and helped to make it the most successful nautical event of the season.

Enjoyable as it was from the afternoon was hardly an ideal one to the racing enthusiast. The day was too fine. There was a pretty good breeze to commence with but towards the last of the race the wind died away and for a while there were almost a dead calm over the still water could be heard occasionally the none too complimentary remarks of the racing course addressed apparently to the Weather Man. "A wet sheet and a flowing set" could not be expected on so still a day but it is only then that the true yachtsman throws away his chewing gum and really begins to get to work.

The capable yacht, Emerald J., built by Mr. Malcolm Irwin and owned and captained by Mr. Kenneth McDonald led practically all the way and finished first, covering the course in two hours. Scarcely twelve seconds behind her came the Pollywog (Mr. John Mills) and following a close third came the Buddy (Messrs. Buntain and Reddin). Unfortunately the Buddy fouled a buoy at Messervy's Point on the second turn and was disqualified. The third place being given to the Tomorrow (Mr. Wallie McDonald). The other yachts finished as follows: 4th Sparkplug, 6th Pegnose, 7th Shamrock, 8th Lofly, 9th "H. B. C.", 10th The Sheik.

The judging committee Messrs. J. C. Moran, Jas. King and Capt. Lowrie performed their duties to the satisfaction of all the competitors.

### PREACHED ABLE SERMON.

Expressing his gratitude at the privilege of speaking again in this grand old church in which he had preached over sixty years ago, Rev. William Ryan, now of Annapolis Valley, father of the present pastor of the Methodist Church, preached a powerful and eloquent sermon last night before an unusually large congregation. Over ninety years of age, the venerable preacher retains all his vigor and eloquence and his sermon last night was a revelation to the audience. He took for his text Numbers 12, 3: "Now the man Moses was very meek, above all the men which were on the face of the earth." He stressed the effect on the life of Moses of the moral teaching received from God, fearing parents and pointed out that man alone is responsible for the character he builds and that great possibilities are wrapped up in a little life. At the conclusion of his sermon Rev. Ryan said he had been privileged to preach in the old church which stood upon the site of the present one. He had come to the island as a young man with the late Rev. Ingram Sutcliffe sixty-five years ago this month, and had been stationed on the island for twenty years in Kings County. Five years after he was stationed at Pownal, Nova Scotia. During his stay there the "brick church" as it was called was opened. God had spared him through all the years and it was with a feeling of deep thankfulness that he found himself again addressing the congregation of the Methodist Church in Charlottetown. The morning service yesterday was taken by the pastor, Rev. W. M. Ryan. The music by the choir was rendered with very fine effect. The evening praise service included a solo "Teach me to pray" by the church choir. Prof. Fletcher, the duet being taken by Mrs. Fletcher and Mr. Elmer Ritchie.
