EDITOR'S MAIL.

OUR HUMILIATION.

SIR.—Considering the Government's attitude towards the transportation of passengers in the Dominion, it is a humiliation. When a man puts himself into one of the Government straps after paying twenty cents a mile, for the privilege of pulling a boat which conveys him to his mill, he becomes a veritable beast of burden. Of the particular sort of beast he resembles most one cannot see the conviction that it is the ass and that of the docile type that has forgotten how to kick. The only time when the ass is compelled to place his feet on the water when he suddenly becomes transformed into an aquatic fowl closely allied to the Gans is goose.

It is only after having gone through the trying and painful experience that a person can fully appreciate the reality of the humiliation he is subjected to on the part of a great and rich Dominion which boasts of its revenues and splendid transportation facilities. This instinctively becomes the subject of meditation when the head is bowed in the yoke of servitude and the weary flaps mechanically pull the Government's mails for which privilege he has so dearly paid.

It is there if he is not too preoccupied by the thought of death, that he concludes that he is a veritable ass when he is not a veritable goose. It is somehow hard for a self-respecting man to get used to the oft-repeated and imperious command of the Government official shouting "Pull, passengers! Out, passengers and pull!" At the same time while he is being pulled he can see the happy gentlemen at Ottawa applying their wings at some elaborate function or wandering in their place in the House what Prince Edward Island has to complain of. Let me say dear gentlemen who subject us to these things: Come down and take your place at the straps and learn the hardships and humiliation of men who are just as cultured and just as blue-blooded as any of you. Please also remember that nearly forty years ago you gave your solemn promise that you would not subject us to this humiliation and this is why we turned to you.

Shall we ever have the Tunnel? I think we shall, but I also think something more could be done to hasten it. Has the Government of this country the right to ask a man to become a beast of burden after it has taken an exorbitant sum for transporting him? I think not. Has the Government any right to charge a rate higher than the standard transportation rates? I think not. Why should the Government haul a man from, say, Charlottetown to Cape Traverse in a heated and upholstered car for three cents a mile and then compel him to haul the Government mail in a rude boat and pay that same Government twenty cents a mile for the privilege of doing so? Let the Government explain the inconsistency in view of their promise not to do such things.

Is not the Government morally and legally bound to put on enough boats, if they must use this primitive form of service, to give every man a seat and pay enough men to haul them the entire distance for the standard rate of our fare? Under the circumstances could they compel a man to walk and pull, and could they compel any passenger to pay more than thirty cents for the passage from one train to the other? I think not. As a matter of fact, we are compelled to pay \$2.50, which is simply an outrage.

Now I think one way to hasten the Tunnel would be for the local Legislature to ask the Dominion Government to put on sufficient boats to carry all passengers male and female and reduce the rate to the standard rate. If the Dominion Government refused to comply, then let the local Government perform the service and charge the cost up to the federal Government. They would be compelled to pay either by the Transportation Commission or the Privy Council.

If they delayed a boy could be declared against all Canadian trade outside the Maritime Provinces. Let the people either by local Government sanction or by common consent absolutely refuse to handle or use any goods made in any part of Canada outside the Province. Since we could not impose a tariff this course would be perfectly justifiable in order to show the people of the west that the question is larger than P. E. Island. It is a Dominion question which could be represented from all parts of the country. If the manufacturers and producers of the west were in danger of losing the hundreds of thousands of dollars of trade which they have with us they would cry Tannet as lustily as any P. E. Islander.

If something like this were done we would get the Tunnel as soon as modern machinery could build it, and then and not till then would we be transformed from asses into manly men.

THE KING'S COUNTY GUARDIAN

Wedding bells are heard in Murray Harbor North. On Wednesday the 14th inst. B. F. Higginbotham, of Battenberg, Alberta, was united in marriage to Miss Mary Ellen Clow, a Cardigan. The bride was attended by Miss Daisy Higginbotham, and Albert McLeod acted as groomsmen. The ceremony was performed at the house.

Murray Harbor North is having genuine March winds and weather here with occasional fresh supplies of snow to keep the roads in repair. Colds and grippe have been prevalent in the community for some time past causing a good deal of sickness of late. Among those who have been seriously ill but are now convalescent are John Graham, Thomas Graham, Hudson and Mrs Samuel Lewylen, and Newton Hicken, and Mrs. Mary Clow.

On the 17th ult. Murray Harbor North lost one of her venerable and most highly respected and esteemed citizens by the death of Mary Clow, widow of the late William MacKay. The deceased was in the 83rd year of her age and had been in the enjoyment of her usual health until within a few weeks of her death. She was one of the old landmarks, a humble Christian and a mother in Israel, a devoted and consistent member for many years of the Presbyterian church. Her last illness was severe but of short duration. During her sickness, family, friends, and physician did what they could to minister to her comfort and relief. Three sons survive her to mourn their loss: William MacKay who lives on the old homestead and with whom the deceased mother spent the closing years of her life; John and George MacKay who reside in Lexington, Mass.

On the evening of the 11th Feb'y, a deep gloom was cast over Murray Harbor North by a telegram from the West, bearing tidings of the sudden death of Andrew McClure in the hospital at Winnipeg, Manitoba. The deceased left his home in Murray Harbor, Jan. 14, to seek his fortune in the West. A contracted cold it would seem developed into typhoid fever, of which he died on Feb. 9th a few days after entering the hospital. Mr. McClure died at the early age of twenty-three years. For the last two or three years he had been one of the salesmen in Benjamin Clow's large store where he became quite popular. He leaves a young widow and a fond mother to mourn their loss, and also three brothers, William, Gavin, and Courtney McClure, all of whom reside at Murray Harbor North. His mortal remains arrived at his mother's home on the 20th ult. and were accompanied by his cousin Andrew Kennedy of Winnipeg, who attended on the deceased during his indisposition before being removed to the hospital and who after death did everything necessary to be done in order to get the body ready for transportation to the burial. The deceased was a member of the Independent Order of Foresters of Murray Harbor North, Court J. G. Cameron, 3011. A number of the members of the Court met the body on its arrival at Georgetown and conveyed it to his mother's home at 11 ul., and was one of the largest scenes here for years.
