All other "Help Wanted" advertisements, however, must be submitted by the advertiser to the National Selective Service office, Unemployment Insurance Commission, O. O. F. Hall, Richmond Street, and on receiving the officer's approval the advertisements can then be inserted in The Charlottetown Guardian.

NEWSY NOTES

It is hard for us to picture the Old England of Palaeolithic Man. As the glaciers retreated at the close of the Great Ice Age, somewhere about 10,000 years ago, they left Eng. and a part of the European continent. The Thames, as I have already said, was a tributary of the Rhine, which flowed northward past the dreary marsh lands surrounding the heights now lying 30 fathoms or more beneath the waves, and known as the Dogger Bank.

As the deer roved northward, our remote forefathers—yours and mine—followed in little bands in quest of food. We can form little conception of their appearance or culture from their relics, a few fragments of cranial and numerous flint and bone implements of flint and bone. But there is no reason to suppose that they resembled the race of aboriginal men pictured by Horace as "mutum ac turpe pecus".

Of Harward's personality and character, apart from Mather's eulogy, we know very little, for, so far as we know, he died less than fourteen months after his arrival, on September 24th, 1638, "not a consumption." His books, inherited by Harward College, were mostly by a theological character, including Roman Catholic, Puritan and other Protestant works. There were also classical Greek and Latin, in their original tongues; some of the latest books on philosophy and three medical works. By will he left the College one-half of his estate—less than 800 pounds. Small as this was, it was twice as much as the Colony as a whole contributed, and it stimulated donations from other citizens. In March, 1638, the General Court voted that the college be named Harward College.

In 1834 a citizen of Charlottetown presented the Harward University with a handsome statue of John Harward, and Charlottetown honors the memory of its earliest citizen in Harward Square and Harward Street, as well as Harward School. Harward's gravestone is still pointed out to the children in the form of a granite obelisk on the Phipps Street Burial Hill.

Files on the Window Pane. There were files, big and little, on the window-panes, in great numbers last summer; it was indeed a high percentage to keep them out of the house. Now, getting acquainted with the two-winged files (which systematists call Diptera) is the third of the present writers.

"It has been our lot," says a recent writer, "to sit at the corner of Europe and receive influences from many directions, from the south, and south-west. Hardly a major wave of civilization has surged across Europe, but sooner or later has broken on our shores. It is in this variegated tradition, this mixture of ideas, that the British people find their heritage.

Times Britain was to reap the benefit of her position on the flank of Europe. Archaeologists now recognize two major varieties of flint implements: those fashioned from flakes previously removed from the parent core or nodule; and those formed from the core itself by removal of waste flint. The flake implements are found to the eastward as far as Mongolia, whereas the core implements are found south of the Himalayas. These two streams of human progress reached Britain and merged there in that remote period. (To be Continued.)

John Harward. The United States has reason to reverence the memory of two Englishmen of the early days—Smithson who founded the Smithsonian Institution, and John Harward, a commoner in England, was thereby enabled to spend several years at Emmanuel College, Cambridge. At the age of twenty-five he received his B.A., degree, and three years later his M.A. In general, candidates for these degrees had an eye to positions in the Established Church, but Harward seems to have been ordained as a nonconformist minister, though he never acquired a parish, neither in England nor afterwards in America. A year later he married, and shortly after, having received his final share of the family fortune he sailed for the New World in the summer of 1637. At that period the business of raising cattle was very popular in the "Massachusetts Bay Colony" and John Harward took with him several men-servants and enough head of cattle to give him a good start in his new vocation. "His fortune," we are told, "must have included the library of over 400 volumes that he was later to bequeath to the college; that was about to open in Newtowne, later called Cambridge, Mass."

This college had been founded some time and the General Court had in 1636, promised \$400 towards such an institution. In November, 1637, the Court appointed a committee to oversee the new college for five years, and chose one Nathaniel Eaton, a graduate of Cambridge, to be the first head of the college. Eaton, it may be remarked, had been a fellow passenger of Harward, on the long journey across the Atlantic. The Harward's chose Charlottetown as the place for their new home, and arrived there on August 1, 1637. It was a small town, then, for the pasturing of John's large herd of cattle, and he either bought or erected a "comely and fair" residence, as an addition to the 150 houses already in the town. In November of the same year John Harward was formally admitted as a member of the Church, and became a resident citizen of the town. As there was no ordained Teaching Elder in the Parish, he was invited to perform that service for the first time, and this he did so well that Cotton Mather called him a "Reverend and Excellent Minister of the Gospel," though as yet without a parish.

hobbies, and with the help of a "killing-bottle" kindly prepared for him by Professor Cannon of the Entomological Laboratory, he took advantage of a very favorable combination of circumstances and gathered in quite a number of these two-winged pests.

It may occur to some of a utilitarian turn of mind, to ask what is the use or object of troubling oneself with such insignificant creatures? To these doubters it may be sufficient to reply that the common house-fly carries the germs of typhoid, dysentery (steak-hack flin), anthrax, and some other diseases. The common stability is known to carry other and more insidious maladies, and is succeeded of spreading infantile paralysis, though no definite proof seems yet to be forthcoming. The mosquitoes, in addition to being extremely annoying, are the carriers of blackwater and yellow fevers, malaria, and encephalitis. The house-fly and mosquito are serious pests of live-stock. One might go on for quite a while listing the misdeeds of the Diptera, not omitting the fact that sometimes a species of that Order acts as a body-fly in a feeding man! However, enough has been written to show that these creatures are "worth keeping an eye on."

How many kinds of flies such as these are estimated to exist in the world today? It is hard to say, but in 1928, Wiedemann, the total number of species was more than 80,000; and Aldrich listed 8,000 as North American. Probably these numbers are well out of date, for new species and genera are constantly being discovered. So very few have been given more than a passing mention. I hope to give at least the scientific names of "the flies on my window-panes."
