One can't guess is that these shares are being dressed up a bit pending a merger with Brompton and Lake St. John and in this connection the Street understands that the Brompton shareholders are to be given a one share of Class A stock which will pay a \$2 dividend annually. Besides it is contended that these Class A shares will be convertible into common on a basis of 2 for 1.

More Mergers

Will 1930 be a merger year? Certain indications suggest that it will even surpass 1928 and 1929 in huge consolidations. In the newspaper field the situation there is every reason to believe that further mergers can be expected.

The way has recently been opened on some cases. In utilities the complete merging of certain interlocking companies is looked for besides one more bank merger might be consummated. Nor will the industrial corporations be unrepresented in this merging trend. As a matter of fact, a slower pace of business and a consequent keen competitive condition in the fore part of the year are more likely than not to result in the absorption of numerous weaker companies by the stronger units—and on terms generally favorable to the latter.

Canadian Mineral Industry Shows High Record For 4th Year in Succession

In 1929, for the fourth year in succession, the mining industry of Canada reached a new high record of output. Gains of \$18,200,000 in the output value of copper and nickel, \$5,500,000 in the production of structural materials, \$2,000,000 in the value of lead and zinc, another \$2,000,000 in the value of crude oil and a \$1,000,000 rise in asbestos output were highlights in the past year in mining. The total output value was \$20,876,000 or 10.5 per cent more than in the preceding year, according to S. J. Cook, chief of the mining branch of the Bureau of Statistics.
