CITY & COUNTRY NEWS

Among the passengers leaving the city last night by the outward mail train were Messrs. B. Dawson, F. P. Carvell, T. J. Dillon and W. Minto Messrs. Marsh and Massey the well-known commercial men.

The trains were somewhat delayed yesterday by the drifted condition of the track. A telegram received last night states that Conductor Kelly got as far as Harper's about two miles from Tigash.

Owing to the expected arrival of a brother and sister of the late Miss Annie B. Howitt, the funeral will not take place until Thursday the 21st at 2.30 p. m. The interment will be in the People's Cemetery.

YESTERDAY'S market received only a fair attendance. The storm in the country was quite severe in many sections. A few loads of pork offered and 7 1/2 was the prevailing price. Oats have made a slight advance and 30 cents was paid for black, while 30 was paid for white; potatoes are apparently a drug on the market and there are apparently no persons buying. A load exchanged hands at 22 cents but the sale was made for retail purposes. The hay market has declined and only 50 cents was paid yesterday. In a few cases where stock was exceptionally good 55 cents was paid. Butchers are paying for sheep live weight, 3 1/2 to 4 1/4, the latter is paid only for very choice animals. Cattle (steers) present delivery live weight 4 cents. Extra prime for Easter 4 1/2 to 5. Cattle sold to a butcher for dressing 5 to 7 cents; sheep, dressed 5 to 7 cents.

THE HOUSE

OPENED

Attendance of Spectators Very Large. APPOINTMENTS MADE The Speech Short and Only Two Measures are Promised in it.

The first session of the thirty fourth Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island was opened at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon by His Honor Lieutenant Governor McIntyre. The agreeable afternoon was conducive to a large number of spectators on the square, while in the legislative hall, the attendance was the largest for years, a very large number of ladies and gentlemen occupying seats on the floor of the House. The boom of cannon at Fort Edward announced the departure from Government House, and in a few minutes after His Honor Lieut. Governor McIntyre, accompanied by his Aide-de-Camp, Lieut. Col. Moore, D. O. C., arrived, preceded by the Sergeant-at-Arms, Capt. D. L. Hooper, bearing his staff of office. The band of the 4th Regt. played the National Anthem as His Honor drove up in front of the main entrance. His Honor, after entering the building proceeded to the Assembly room and took the Speaker's chair, the members remaining standing until the conclusion of the speech. After the Speaker elect had made the usual formal claims His Honor read his speech:

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF THE PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, ON OPENING THE FIRST SESSION OF THE THIRTY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY, ON TUESDAY, THE 19 DAY OF MARCH 1901. MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. SPEECH. In welcoming you to the First Session of the Thirty-fourth Assembly, I am pleased to state that this Province has shared in the general prosperity of the Dominion, consequent to a great extent upon the abundant crops and the fairly good prices obtained for our products. For these blessings we have great reason to be thankful to a bountiful Providence. The nation of which we form a part has lately been called to mourn the demise of our beloved Sovereign Queen Victoria, and I feel sure that in no part of the Empire have her many noble qualities as a Queen and a Woman been more highly admired or her death more sincerely lamented than in this Province. Deeply as we feel the loss of a Ruler so great and so good, we rejoice to believe that in her Royal Son and Successor, King Edward the seventh, we welcome a Sovereign upon whom we can rely to follow in the footsteps of his illustrious mother. I have no doubt you will take the earliest opportunity to express the deep sense of bereavement, that is felt by the people you have the honor to represent upon the death of a monarch whose reign was so long and so glorious as well as to congratulate the King upon his accession to the Throne, and whose authority as loving subjects we heretofore acknowledge. It is a matter of devout thanksgiving that in the long and arduous struggle in South Africa, British Arms have been victorious and equal rights and freedom, as exemplified under British rule, is assured to the people of that country. FREDERICTON, March, 19.—(Special).—Before the Public Accounts Committee today Mr. Humphrey asked to have the Manager of the Bank of British North America called to explain an over-draft of \$97,198.21 but the Government declined to permit this and the matter will probably be brought up in the House.

BIG FIRE AT ELLERSLIE.

YESTERDAY afternoon Ellerslie was visited by a disastrous fire. Owing to the destruction of the telephone office accurate details could not be obtained but a telephone message from Summerside last night stated that a strong wind was blowing at the time. The fire started on the roof of A. A. McCall's store and before it had run its course the store

warehouse and tailor shop adjoining and occupied by Mr. Miller were destroyed. Mr. McCall loses everything, including a portion of his spring stock of goods. A quantity of oats in the warehouse owned by Capt. Richards was also burned. Mr. Miller saved his stock. The furniture in the Orange Hall in the second story of Mr. McCall's store was also destroyed. Rejected by Botha—Lord Salisbury Reported to be Falling Daily.

LONDON, March 19.—(Special).—Those who have heard Lord Salisbury's recent speeches in and out of Parliament are impressed with his apathy and lack of vigor. He has been aged greatly these past few months and his early retirement is looked for.

BOTHA REJECTS PEACE PROPOSALS. Mr. Chamberlain informed the House of Commons that Botha had rejected the peace proposals. All the papers will be laid before Parliament.

THE CHINESE DIFFICULTY. Chinese reports say that a satisfactory settlement of the existing difficulties between England and Russia has been reached but the Government does not admit the settlement and the difficulty is apparently still far from arranged.
