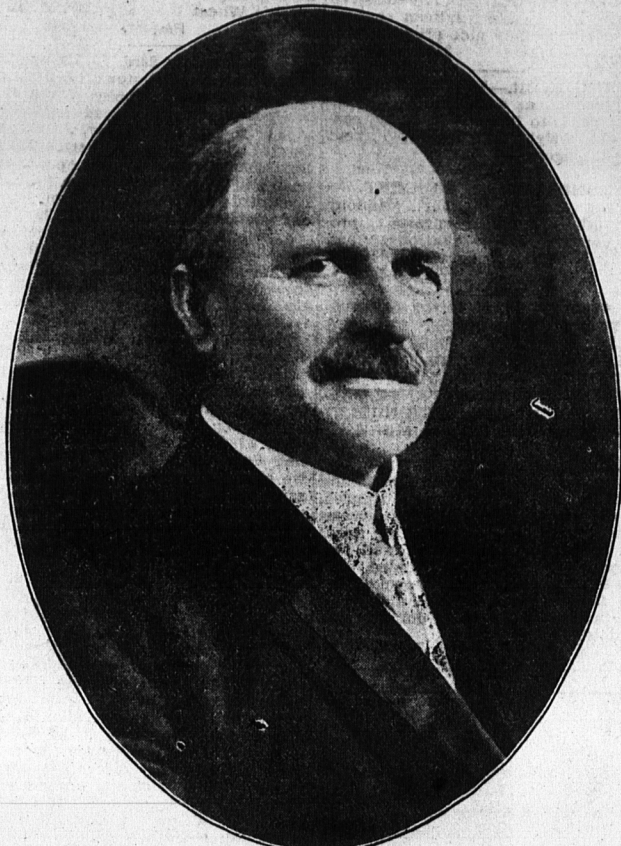

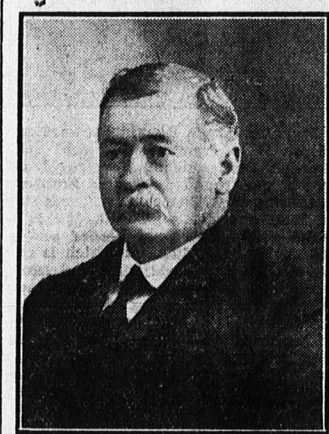
HON. MR. MCKINNON said:—The reason for Mr. McVie's bitterness lies in the fact that I REJECTED THE OFFER MADE BY REV. MR. WILSON TO HAVE MR. McVIE APPOINTED AS PROSECUTOR FOR KING'S COUNTY. Rev. Mr. Wilson who was friendly with me at the time came to my office and suggested that Mr. McVie should be appointed prosecutor. I told him that I DID NOT KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT MR. McVIE AND REFUSED TO RECOMMEND HIS APPOINTMENT.

REV. W. D. WILSON ADMITTED THAT HE HAD TOLD MR. MCKINNON THAT MR. McVIE WOULD MAKE A GOOD PROSECUTOR, but challenged Mr. McKinnon to deny that he did so more than once. MR. MCKINNON said after he had turned down the nomination of Mr. McVie, Mr. Wilson did not visit his office more than once—or twice at the most.

Hence all this parsonical turmoil in Mr. McKinnon's district. If two itinerant parsons think they can come into this Province and make trouble among its people they are very

much mistaken, no matter how many disgruntled lawyers they call to their assistance.

SPLENDID MEETING AT NORTH WILTSHIRE

ince when the present government came into power was \$1,072,000, consisting of \$904,000 at the 30th Sept., 1911, \$83,000 of a debt, scandalously incurred from that date to December 2nd, 1911, and \$85,000 of unpaid liabilities. The previous government annually made an average deficit of \$85,000 and financial ruin stared the province in the face. The present government had to tackle a falling revenue, a growing deficit and decayed public works. The teachers were leaving the province owing to lack of encouragement.

The Premier then dealt with the subsidy question, pointing out that in 1907 when Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at the general Conference of Premiers, asked that each province should present any claim to special consideration which they might have, the Liberal delegates from P. E. I. sat mute and never opened their mouths. In 1912 the first obstacle the present government met in its mission to secure the subsidy was the objection that in 1907 the then government failed absolutely. In spite of the emphatic warning that the settlement then was "final and unalterable," the present Government did not hesitate to take advantage of the opportunity offered to them. In regard to Mr. J. J. Hughes and his self-imposed association with the subsidy question, the Premier, in language bitingly sarcastic, showed how absurd it was for an insignificant member of the Opposition like that gentleman, who had never succeeded in doing anything for the benefit of the Province, to lay claim to having secured the subsidy, which was assured the Mathieson Delegation, by the ministry at Ottawa, twelve days before Mr. Hughes opened his mouth in the matter in the House! It was as well for the humiliated fly on a carriage wheel, to claim that it kicked up all the dust. (Laughter). The Premier also made it clear that while the Province has secured this magnificent subsidy, not a single claim has been settled, EVERY ONE HAVING BEEN LEFT OPEN FOR FURTHER PRESSURE.

Mr. Hughes had claimed that the Liberals built public buildings, etc. Certainly they did, that was perfectly true. But, he pointed out, their expenditures on these buildings amounted to an average of \$10,000 a year in twenty years, against an average of \$40,000 a year more by the present Government. The only really good bridge the Liberals built,—and it was too narrow—was that across the North River,—

and for that the present government had to pay! Whereas the Grigs built 911 feet of steel bridges in twenty years, the Conservative Government put up approximately 2400 in three years! With regard to the charges of extravagance, the Premier dealt with this subject very carefully and showed to the satisfaction of even the most rabid partisan, that while the cost was more, the work in each department of the Public service has been INFINITELY AND IMMEASURABLY BETTER than under the late government.

In regard to the oyster question, the Premier pointed out that in twenty years—during the Liberal regime, the production had been shamefully allowed to decline from 55,000 barrels to 8,000 barrels a year. The charge that the government was leasing ice was not founded on facts; and so far from the satisfaction of even the most rabid partisan, that while the cost was more, the work in each department of the Public service has been INFINITELY AND IMMEASURABLY BETTER than under the late government.

Dealing with the automobile question, the statement of Mr. Hughes that, in regard to the opening of the route to the North Shore the names of five men who were dead were attached to the petition, the Premier flatly and absolutely contradicted. The list of names was in the Provincial Building and any man who cared could inspect it and see how false was Mr. Hughes' statement.

The dog tax, he explained, was fixed at the urgent request of the Central Institute of the Farmers' Institutes of Prince Edward Island, and he pointed out that the present Leader of the Opposition, during his term of office, EXPRESSED STRONGLY HIS REGRET THAT A HEAVY TAX BE PLACED ON DOGS!

In this connection a would-be humorist in the audience, a too smart young man thought he would perpetrate a joke at the speaker's expense, and he said something which, for the moment made the others laugh, but another had said aloud "Give us the dog tax; let us hear about the dog tax."

"Yes," chimed in the bright young man; "tell us all about the dog tax and the old mother dog!" The Premier replied: "Yes; the old mother dog and the pups of all ages," taking in the group of young men in a comprehensive and indulgent gesture. The ready retort settled it. The audience, hooting the unfortunate young man, burst into a roar of unrestrained laughter, and the victim, needless to say, shrank into microscopic littleness.

The other Liberal candidate, Mr. John McMillan, also spoke, and was adequately dealt with by Messrs. Buntain and Jenkins, who gave excellent addresses.

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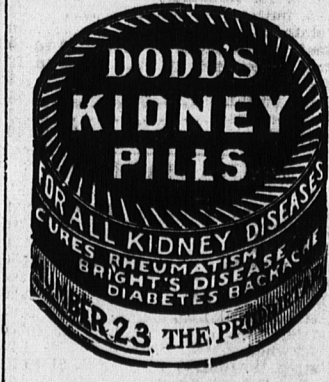
