HYDRO-ELECTRIC DEVELOPMENTS TORONTO, Feb. 21.—Expenditures approximating between two and three million dollars are involved in the construction programme of the hydro-electric power commission for this year. After a meeting of the committee today, on Adam Beck, chairman, outlined the scope of the work that would be undertaken. In addition to the duplication of a trunk line of the Niagara system from Dundas to Niagara Falls, which will cost about \$600,000, a forty thousand volt line to Welland is to be immediately constructed of extra construction at the cost of \$400,000.

FRENCH SCULPTOR'S GIFT TO FRENCH ART PARIS, Feb. 21.—Paul Jacquier, Under Secretary of State for Fine Arts, announced in the Chamber of Deputies today that negotiations had been concluded with Auguste Rodin, whereby the French sculptor presents to France the whole of his collection of Greek, Roman and Egyptian art and also all of his own works save his possession. The gift is creating a Rodin museum in the residence now occupied by W. Rodin and appointing him custodian for life. M. Jacquier on behalf of the French cabinet today introduced a bill in the chamber complying with M. Rodin's conditions.
