Optimistic Outlook For Poultry Crop

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) PRESQUE LESLE, Me., Oct. 17.—Potato growers feel more optimistic today that unharmed potatoes in Aroostook County might be salvaged before freezing weather halted operations for good. Heavy snow which overspread the Aroostook potato empire last week with nearly a fifth of the State's estimated 52,000,000 bushel crop has been a popular and promising sign today, giving rise to hopes that digging could be resumed.

Blackmailers Get Stiff Sentences

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Oct. 17.—Penitentiary and reformatory terms totalling twelve and a half years were handed down today by Mr. Justice J. C. M. M. to the conclusion to trials that followed police inquiry into an alleged blackmail ring. Four persons were sentenced, including a mother and her son who will spend five years in penitentiary. Mrs. Mae Turnbull, 50, described by Justice M. M. as the "moving spirit" of the blackmail ring, five years in Portmouth Penitentiary. Franklin Taylor, Sr., 62, former husband of Mrs. Turnbull, 18 months in the Ontario Reformatory. Mrs. Rosa Taylor, 24, wife of Frank Taylor, Jr., one year in Mercer Reformatory. Mrs. Turnbull, her son and his wife were convicted Monday of stealing \$200 from "Mr. D." Evidence showed the money was paid over after "Mr. D." had been found in the Taylor home with Mrs. Rosa Taylor. Mrs. Turnbull also pleaded guilty to stealing \$10,885 from "Mr. A." and her former husband, Frank Taylor Sr., admitted stealing \$1,000 from the same person. The Crown charged the money was obtained from "Mr. A." after he had been found in a compromising position with Mrs. Turnbull.

IN MEMORIAM

LEITH WRIGHT

Citizens will learn with regret of the sudden passing of Leith Wright, aged 50 years, accountant of the Marine Department, which occurred at his home, 55 Hillsborough Street, shortly after noon Tuesday.

The deceased, who was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Wright, was well and favourably known, was a young man of pleasing personality, with a cheery and jovial disposition. Called in the prime of life with many years of usefulness before him, his large circle of friends will mourn the loss of a true friend and kind companion.

He entered the service of the Marine Department as clerk, June 8th, 1910, and by strict attention to his duties, was gradually promoted to chief clerk and then accountant, which position he held at the time.

In 1916 the late Mr. Wright, securing leave of absence, went overseas with the 2nd Seige Battery, under command of Major Prowse, remaining until the conclusion of the war.

When the Meteorological Office was removed from the Post Office Building some years ago, and removed to the present building, the late Mr. Wright assumed the work of this department in connection with the office.

In his passing the Central Christian Church loses a faithful and consistent member, and one who took a prominent part in all its activities.

In 1920 he married Hazel Stewart who was a ten year old daughter of Catherine, surviving widow of the memory of a kind and loving husband and father.

Surviving are also three brothers and one sister, viz: Fred, in Texas; Bertram, residing in Beverly, Ontario; and Oswald in Digby, N. S. (the latter has been in the service some days ago after a short visit here, and Mrs. James T. McKee of this city.

The funeral will be held, this Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mortgage Sale CANADA'S UNSOLVED MYSTERIES

To be sold by public auction in front of the Law Courts Building in Charlottetown, on Saturday the 10th day of November, A.D. 1934, at the hour of twelve o'clock noon, all that tract piece and parcel of land situate lying and being on lot or township number thirty-six in Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, bounded and described as follows, that is to say: Commencing at a stake fixed to the shore of Bedford Bay at the northwest angle of a tract of seventy-five acres of land now or formerly in the possession of Andrew McPhee, thence south seventy-one degrees east one hundred and one chains, thence by a line parallel to the shore until it obtains a breadth of five chains, thence north seventy-one degrees west to the shore, and from thence along the shore to the place of commencement, containing fifty acres of land a little more or less.

The instrument with which the crime was committed was an axe according to the late Dr. Wilfrid Derrime, noted Montreal medical expert, who conducted an investigation of the crime with the provincial police.

What baffled the authorities at the time of the murder was the apparent lack of motive behind the deed. A sum of \$3,000 placed in an old safe which could easily have been broken open by an expert bank robber was not touched. Bernard and his wife apparently had no enemies in the village. All strangers who had been in the neighborhood gave satisfactory accounts of their actions to the police.

The little bank failed to open on the morning of Oct. 24 which was a Saturday. This and the fact Bernard had intimated to friends he might be absent for the day prevented the discovery of the double murder until Sunday. The two had been regular attendants at the High Mass and neighbors decided to investigate. Their calls at the Bernard home being unanswered three strong men burst in the door of the building in which the bank was also located. A horrifying scene met their gaze. Bernard's body was stretched across the landing of a stairway leading to the second storey and that of his wife was found on the floor of a bedroom. Both were in night attire.

The police believed Bernard was hit on the back of the head with the axe and sent hurtling down the stairs while his wife was struck down when she got out of bed at hearing the disturbance.

After several days' of careful search the police found traces of blood leading from the Bernard house through a nearby apple orchard. Bloodhounds were procured and put on this trail. The dogs took the police to some underbrush where a .32 calibre revolver was found. Although three cartridges had been extracted from the gun the autopsy revealed no bullets in the bodies of the banker and his wife.

The crime was committed on a stormy night. Winds were howling through the trees enough to drown any cries the victims may have made when attacked.
