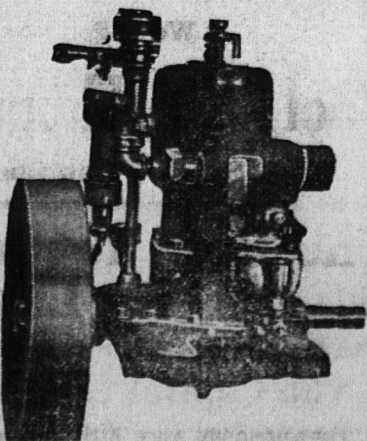

## FROM FRANCE

The following interesting letter has been received by Mr. Ernest Griffin, of Albion, from her son, W. B. Davey, who is at the front:—

France, April 23, '15.  
Dear Mother:  
Had a few moments to spare so decided to drop you a line. Arrived back to the regiment Sunday. We are in the firing line now for three days and then we go for a rest for three. We see some fine air raids from here. Once our aeroplanes approach the firing line, the artillery opens on them and it is exciting watching them try to bring one down. The weather is fine now and the trenches are a lot drier, so we may not be doing trench work for long. We have lots of trench digging to do, but when you know it is for your own safety you don't mind. We have a stove in our section and the boys all come around to cook. It is funny to see some of the meals they cook; anything from a stew to a pudding. Sometimes our meals are disturbed, but we generally make out fairly well. Biscuits and bully beef are the main issue and you rustle the rest once in a while, and pay day comes around we flock to the village for our necessities to take into the trenches. Some of us won't be particular after this is over, where we sleep or what we eat. I have some souvenirs I would like to send you but there is no chance. Had a narrow escape last night. A bullet hit me on the wrist after it ricocheted off a tree and I am saving it for a souvenir, but it never hurt me. We all claim a miss is as good as a mile. We have lots of good water around here, which comes in handy for cooking. A Jack Johnson hole is our regular place, but we have a pipe system now. Had a letter from Kate and Aunt Bessie. Tell them I will write as soon as possible. We get along with very little sleep. I never seem to want over three or four hours a day. There are quite a number of Canadians out here, but we never see any of them as they are in a different part of the line. By the papers you would think the war would be over in a few weeks. You hear very few opinions out here. Our regiment has done good work. Quite a few of our officers have got the D. S. O. and other medals for bravery and the men can't speak too highly of their work. It makes a difference when you know your officers fear nothing when trying to take a trench or attack one. Have nothing of importance to write only I am well. Hoping you are all well. ## LETTER FROM WOUNDED ISLANDER

Mr. Charles Donovan, of Charlottetown, received the following letter from Mr. J. Bowden, who was wounded in the recent big fighting around Langemarck:

Fir Vale Hospital, Sheffield, Eng., May 3rd, 1915.

Dear Friend:—

Just another little chat to let you know that I am still living.

This war is certainly terrible and I was in one of the hottest parts of it. I guess you have read a lot about Ypres, better known as Hill 60, or Ypres Canal. One wouldn't realize what kind of a place it is until he had seen it. I must say I have seen some terrible sights and don't want to see any more—the dead piled on top of one another (mostly Germans) the wounded kicking and crawling to the rear, some with legs, arms or heads nearly shot off, trying to help each other along; the roar of guns and the bursting of shells in the air, which continued for week, or till the day I got hit. Then I left the firing line altogether.

## LETTER FROM WOUNDED ISLANDER

I must say that our battery may be thankful that we are all alive today. Only seven of us got hit, including our Sergeant Major.

It was a great sight to see the Germans running from our infantry, who went for them with fixed bayonets, and to see them falling dead from our shrapnel fire. But they were without food or water. But when the relief came with the word that the Canadians had taken what the French lost, and had saved the position, it put the cheer of life into the hearts of all who were left.

I expect to be able to move around in a few days or so, but I think it will be a couple of weeks before I go back to the firing line again, so I will have a few days in London once more. I expect to come home soon as the war is nearly over.
