BUS FRANCHISES—Six bus franchises are now held over Island highways, according to information received by the Provincial Treasurer's department. Four of the franchises are held by the I.M.T. bus services as follows: Summerside to Tignish by the main Western Road, detouring at Elmsdale to include Alberton. Charlottetown to Borden by the Bonshaw route; and Borden to Summerside by way of the highway. Charlottetown to Summerside and Summerside to Borden by way of the highway. The I.M.T. Bus Company bought the franchise of J. Arthur Lewis over the road from Charlottetown to Souris by way of Mt. Stewart, Five Houses and Souris. Marvin Johnson has bought from Lorne F. Johnston the franchise from Murray River to Charlottetown by way of Peter's Road, Murray Harbor North, Lower Montague and the Georgetown Road. All these franchises expire on February 28, 1938. They give a special license to operate a bus service on these roads, to the exclusion of other buses. The fees charged are at a uniform rate of one dollar per mile per annum, computed one way only.
