MR. PETER SCHURMAN of this town received yesterday from Washington the American patent on his new potato digger which has previously been described in this column. This with the Canadian patent issued some months ago gives him the sole right to manufacture and sell his machine in any part of Canada and the United States. There is no reason why this machine could not be manufactured in this province, and in it capitalists would find a money making industry. There appears not to be satisfactory potato diggers in use on the continent, and the machine referred to having been successfully tried and proved to be an ideal one, there would doubtless be a large and open market for it. Our farmers are looking for something to take the place of the old fashioned and laborious way of ploughing and scratching out their potatoes and are ready to invest in a machine which will save time and expense which is always met with in harvesting these vegetables. The only difficulty now seems to be in the selection of a suitable place for its manufacture. If no one on the island will take hold of it Mr. Schurman will place it in the hands of some firm in Upper Canada. It is in the manufacture and sale of such machinery that our minded men interest themselves and with the opportunity before them they should give the matter their consideration.
