W. CHURCHILL CANNOT COME

Invited to Toronto By Empire Club to Speak, He Sends Regrets, Cannot Visit Canada This Year—Two Children Poisoned to Death By Eating Ice Cream.

TORONTO, Aug. 13.—(Special)—The Empire Club of Toronto which recently sent a cable to Winston Churchill, Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, asking him to address the Club in the event of his coming to Canada, has received a letter from Mr. Churchill expressing his appreciation of the invitation and greatly regrets his inability to accept it, being unable to visit the Dominion this year.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Aug. 13.—(Special)—Two children of George Holloway 9 Vine Avenue are dead of ptomaine poisoning caused by ice cream. The children, aged four and two years ate ice cream on Friday night. The oldest died yesterday morning and the younger last night. Death soon ended their sufferings.

MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

A Memorial Presented Relating to Undervaluation of Real Estate—Other Business Discussed

The City Council met last night, Councilor Hooper presiding in the absence of His Worship Mayor Paton. After routine and the passing of accounts a number of communications were taken up. The chief of these was a memorial to the Council calling attention to the large amount of personal property alleged to be omitted or undervalued for taxes by which the City is said to lose a revenue of \$13,000.

THE MAD MULLAH ON WARPATH AGAIN

LONDON, Aug. 13.—The correspondent at Aden of the Daily Mail reports that the Mad Mullah has raided the Somali-Land border and killed over 1,000 of the Barelbaron in the dwelling in the Ogaon reign and captured 10,000 camels.

GRAND DUKE WILL NOT ACCEPT JOB

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 12.—Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasievitch, the Associated Press is informed by a member of his entourage, has declined to accept the post of commander-in-chief of all the troops of the empire "where martial law exists," which were tendered to him Aug. 1. Whether this was decided before or after the attempt on the life of the grand duke at Krasnoy-Selo on Aug. 10 is not known but the ostensible reason is that Grand Duke Nicholas believes such a post should not be given to a grand duke but to a purely military man. He advocates the appointment of General Linievitch, formerly commander-in-chief of the Manchurian army, but the emperor has not finally decided the matter.

OVERFLOW QUEEN'S COUNTY

The sudden death of Ethel B. daughter of Anthony Flynn, driver on the Prince Edward Island Railway, will be heard with the greatest regret by the many friends of the deceased and of her parents. She was only in her 19th year, and on Saturday night was apparently in the best health. On Sunday she became ill, and passed away, notwithstanding the best attention, last night at 12 o'clock. The home of Mr. Flynn had been severely visited during the past few years. Only two months have elapsed since his son Peter, aged 11 years, was called away. The sincerest sympathy will be felt for the bereaved parents and other members of the family left to mourn. Funeral notice will appear later.

TRAIN KILLS A LITTLE CHILD

Which Followed Its Father to His Work on The Railway Track

BROCKVILLE, Aug. 13.—(Special)—Ada Geary aged one year and eight months, daughter of a Section Foreman, followed her father to work, taking the track a short distance from the house. A passenger train rounded a curve and before the engineer could stop, the baby was hurled into the ditch. Its arm was torn off and body pitifully mangled.

DROWNED WHILE INTOXICATED

A Sailor Going Aboard His Ship the Latest Whisky Victim.

ST. JOHN, August 13.—(Special)—James Kemp, a sailor on the Battle Liner Himeria attempted to board the steamer while drunk, fell into the harbor tonight and was drowned.

WAS BOUND TO SEE PRESIDENT

OSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 12.—Miss Asi L. Esac, who is summing in Oyster Bay for the purpose of interviewing the president or Mrs. Roosevelt on what she declares is "a matter of life and death," created a scene during the service in Christ Episcopal church today. Miss Esac or Miss Case, as her name is supposed to be, has attended every church service at which the president has been present since his arrival here in July. She has climbed Sagamore Hill on foot several times only to be turned away by the secret service men. She presented herself at the church today and took a seat directly behind the pew usually occupied by the Roosevelt family. When usher James Duffy requested her to relinquish this seat she refused. Duffy forcibly removed her to the rear of the church and Miss Esac says he tore her gown in so doing. For this act she later applied for a warrant for Duffy, but was refused.

BRITAIN LOSES TO THE CHINESE

LONDON, Aug. 13.—According to the Times Peking correspondent, there seems little doubt that, in attempting to resume control of the imperial maritime customs, the Chinese officials are following a deliberate policy, and that the British foreign office has been tricked into accepting wholly illusory assurances as to the independence of Sir Robert Hart and the European control which he represents. The Times says that the situation created by the recent changes is plainly one which demands the promptest and most serious attention. The two new Chinese controllers have begun by granting themselves high salaries and opening fine offices in Peking. They direct that no reports or statistical returns may be published until they have approved, or, more probably, censured them; and with intentional impertinence, have appointed a special official to carry their instructions to Sir Robert Hart, whom they designate their foreign servant. Although the promises made to our legation were explicit that no fundamental alterations in service were intended, these have never been promulgated in China, and were not even communicated to Sir Robert Hart. He is therefore unable to issue them as service instructions and finds himself falling daily into growing discredit with his own subordinates.

LONG MISSING CREAMER BABES

Believed to Have Sunk in Bogs or Quicksands Near Their Home—The Kidnapping Theory Discarded and Foul Play Not Believed to Have Occurred.

MONCTON, Aug. 13.—(Special)—That the two long missing Creamer children lost their lives in one of the bogs known as "quicksands," and one of which is located only a few yards from the spot where the children were last seen, is the theory of Constable C. H. Thomas, who returned on Saturday from another three weeks search.

The bogs of which Mr. Thomas speaks are composed of black mud of about the same properties as quicksands. The kidnapping theory, Mr. Thomas believes to be groundless. From numerous conversations with Russell Truholm, Mr. Thomas is satisfied that lad is perfectly innocent of any connection with the children's disappearance.

REV. MR. SIMPSON GOT \$42,000

OLD ORCHARD, Me., Aug. 12.—Cash and pledges footing up about \$42,000 was collected today at the final meeting of the Christian Alliance, a missionary organization of which Dr. A. B. Simpson, of New York, is the leader. The meetings have been in session here two weeks. About 5,000 persons attended the meetings today. The amount raised is regarded as about an average collection, though some years ago the record mark was reached when \$100,000 was collected in one day.

JAP WARSHIP MIKASA RAISED

TOKIO, Aug. 13.—It is reported from Sasebo that after repeated failures the battleship Mikasa, which sank last September after an explosion had occurred on board, was successfully floated. The Mikasa was a flagship of Admiral Togo at the battle of the sea of Japan. She sank after an explosion at Sasebo, Sept. 11th last. Considerable mystery surrounded the cause of the disaster, in which hundreds of lives were lost, the generally accepted figures being 25 killed or missing and 343 more or less seriously injured.
