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Quarterly Session Presbytery Of P. E. Island

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular quarterly session at 11 A. M. on Tuesday May 10th in Zion Church Hall, Charlottetown, and was opened in due form by the Moderator Rev. Fred Williamson.

Those present were—Rev. Fred Williamson, Moderator, Rev. R. Hensley Staver, Clerk, Rev. J. St. Claire Jeans, Rev. Allister Murray, Rev. R. Moorehead Legate, Rev. Alex. R. Gibson, Rev. J. Kier Fraser, D. D., Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, Rev. E. C. Robertson and Rev. D. L. Griffiths, and Messrs. Thos. W. Morrison, Angus McLean, R. G. McLaren, Samuel McPherson, A. E. Morrison and Dr. A. J. Murchison, representative Elders.

Rev. W. H. Rhoad, who has been in charge of the Kensington and Freetown pastoral charge for the past six months and who was present for the first time, was given a hearty welcome to the Court and was asked to sit and correspond.

Others present, not members of the Court, were Rev. M. E. Genge, D. D. and Mr. V. E. Orsborn, student catechist, and Messrs. John McFarlane, A. A. McBeth, Geddie Douglas, Stewart McKinnon, Thos. G. McKenzie, Earl Foster, Elders, and Messrs. John Anderson, John Stetson, J. Rhynes, Cameron McLachlan, Roderick McKenzie, Cameron McPhee, J. McDonald and David Friffeths, representative laymen.

There were two sessions—morning and afternoon.

The correspondence was then dealt with. Under heading came the applications of six men from other churches asking to be received into the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

1. The Presbytery of Paris is making application to the Commission on the Reception of Ministers for permission to receive Rev. H. Bollbroke, B. D. a Minister of the United Church of Canada as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2. The Presbytery of Saskatoon is making application to the Commission on the Reception of Ministers for permission to receive Rev. John Turner, a Minister of the United Church of Canada, as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

3. The Presbytery of Hamilton is making application to The General Assembly for leave to receive Rev. Herbert Wood, a Minister of the Baptist Church in Canada, as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

4. The Presbytery of Glengarry is making application to The General Assembly's Commission on the Reception of Ministers for leave to receive Mr. Wm. D. McRae, B. A. a Licentiate of the Hampden Association of Congregational Churches and Ministers U. S. A. as a Licentiate of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

5. The Presbytery of Glengarry is also making application to the Commission on the Reception of Ministers for permission to receive Rev. Teunis O'denburger, B. D. a Minister of the Dutch Reformed Church in America as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

6. The Presbytery of Cape Breton and Newfoundland is applying to the General Assembly's Commission on the Reception of Ministers for permission to receive Rev. Farquhar McLennan, a Minister of the Congregational Church as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The application of Rev. Teunis O'denburger was disapproved. All of the others were placed on file.

A call from the congregation of Belfast addressed to Rev. D. L. Griffiths who has been supplying there for several months, was presented to the Court by the Interim Moderator of the Belfast Church, Rev. Alex. R. Gibson. The call was signed by 115 communicants and 97 adherents and at the congregational meeting held on May 3rd, it was agreed to pay the salary of \$1800.00 together with the use of the Manse and Glebe and four weeks holidays. At the Presbytery meeting the call was supported by Messrs. Thos. W. Morrison and Thos. G. McKenzie, Elders, and Messrs. Roderick McKenzie, Cameron McPhee and J. McDonald, representative laymen. The call was sustained as a regular Gospel call and on being presented to Rev. Mr. Griffiths was accepted by him.

The induction will take place at 7.30 P. M. on Tuesday June 14th at the Presbyterian Church, Belfast.

The Moderator of Presbytery, Rev. Fred Williamson, will preside and induct, Rev. E. C. Robertson will preach the sermon, Rev. Alex. R. Gibson will narrate the steps leading up to the call, Rev. R. Hensley Staver will give the charge to the newly inducted Minister and Rev. G. Carlyle Webster will ad-

dress the people of the congregation. After a vacancy of some eight months the people of the Belfast congregation are pleased to be about to have a settled minister in their midst.

Geo. A. McDougall, son of the late Rev. James McDougall, was introduced to the Presbytery by Rev. G. Carlyle Webster. Mr. McDougall is a Prince of Wales student and is looking forward to the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Mr. Webster spoke in glowing terms of Mr. McDougall's ability as a student and of his promise as a young man well fitted for the work of the Ministry. Rev. E. C. Robertson who has known Mr. McDougall for years, also spoke very highly of him.

Mr. McDougall was then unanimously recommended by the Presbytery to the Presbyterian College, Montreal, as a young man well qualified in every way to enter upon the course leading to the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, Convener of the Presbytery Home Missions Committee presented the Home Mission Report.

Mr. Legate spoke at some length regarding what had thus far been done to have an ordained man settled at Bradabane, Tryon and Borden. A grant had been secured to supplement the amounts to be raised in these three fields. At

present the Home Mission Committee is waiting for the Church Committee at Borden to finish paying off certain amounts due to men who had been supplying in that field, before another man can be settled there.

Mr. Legate was appointed to attend a meeting to be held in Borden Hall on May 11th to look into the situation there.

Mr. Jeans reported on his recent visit to Borden and told of what had been accomplished thus far. Whenever the people of these three fields are ready an ordained man will be sent to this pastoral charge with a view to a permanent settlement.

The matter of the uniting of the Montague congregation with the congregation of Cardigan, Lorne Valley and Dundas, was dealt with by Rev. Alex. R. Gibson. After Rev. W. E. Davies who had been the pastor of the Cardigan, Lorne Valley, and Dundas congregation had accepted a call to Finch and Crysler, Ont., it was suggested that for the time being at least this congregation be linked up with the Montague congregation. Rev. Mr. Gibson reported that he had taken this matter up with the members and adherents of both congregations, and that all difficulties which at first seemed to be in the way, had been removed, and that all had agreed to carry on together as one pastoral charge.

The Presbytery was very much pleased with the splendid work done by Mr. Gibson in bringing about this temporary union, and it was moved and seconded and carried unanimously that the request from both congregations, asking that they be joined together, be granted. This new arrangement will come into effect after July 1st, 1932. The members of the court spoke of the congregations and the Presbytery as a whole wishes to convey to the members and adherents of these two congregations its deep appreciation of the way in which they have worked this amalgamation out so harmoniously.

Rev. Allister Murray of Caledonia reported that besides taking charge of all the work in his own congregation and in Murray Harbour South, he had also made arrangements to give services to the congregation of Wood Islands. He has worked out a plan whereby in the Summer months, he will be able to give to the Wood Islands congregation one morning service and two afternoon services per month. In addition to the Sunday services he will also give to these people two services per month during the week. In the winter time the Sunday services will be held fortnightly.

The Presbytery commended Mr. Murray very highly for this splendid working arrangement. It was felt by some that he was undertaking to do too much without asking from these two congregations combined, any more remuneration than the minimum salary that he is already receiving from

the one congregation. All concerned have agreed to this new plan which practically came into force on April 1st, 1932.

The matter of the uniting of Clyde River with the Brookfield congregation was laid over for a later date, when it is expected that along with this some further regrouping will take place.

Rev. R. Moorhead Legate was recommended by the Presbytery for appointment as its representative on the General Assembly's General Board of Missions. The commissioners to the General Assembly are requested to bring this matter to the attention of the Assembly's Committee to strike Standing Committees.

Rev. F. Scott McKenzie D. D. Principal of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, is planning a tour of the Presbytery in the Summer months, he will be able to give to the Wood Islands congregation one morning service and two afternoon services per month. In addition to the Sunday services he will also give to these people two services per month during the week. In the winter time the Sunday services will be held fortnightly.

The Committee appointed to look into the question of the securing of a site for the Summer School, and also for holding of this School reported progress. Further announcements will be made in the near future.

Rev. E. C. Robertson was appointed Convener of the Presbytery

Committee on Foreign Missions to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Rev. W. E. Davies, on the acceptance of his call to Finch and Crysler, Ont.

Mr. V. E. Orsborn was re-appointed to the New London congregation for a period of six months. During the past year Mr. Orsborn has done splendid work in this large and important field.

The Rev. M. E. Genge D. D. was re-appointed to the pastoral charge of Marshfield, Mount Stewart, and Highfield for a period of two months.

The Clerk read a recommendation submitted by the Committee appointed by the Maritime Synod, October 1931 to enquire into the question of the advisability of keeping the Pictou Boys' Residence open after the close of the present school year. The Committee recommends that until some better agreement can be made with the Pictou Academy Educational Foundation

places Dr. McKenzie will speak in the Presbyterian Church, Summerside, at 11 A. M. on Sunday July 17th, and in Zion Church, Charlottetown at 7 P. M. the same date. The remainder of his itinerary will be announced later.

The members of Presbytery feeling that this recommendation was a very wise one, under existing conditions, approved of it unanimously.

The next regular quarterly meeting of Presbytery will be held in



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
