### A PATRIOTIC MONUMENT FUND.

The return of our soldiers from South Africa shortly to be looked for, will afford the occasion for an outburst of patriotic enthusiasm that will no doubt exceed the cordial demonstrations which attended their departure a year ago. A ship-load of them sailed from Cape Town a few days ago, and they are due to arrive at Halifax about 24th October. A very warm welcome doubtless awaits them in every province where they have their homes. But the joy over those who return will be mingled with sadness and regret for those who can never come back to us, who have given their lives for their country. We have therefore to commemorate not only the splendid heroism and endurance of those who are returning to their homes and firesides, but the courage and devotion of those who sleep their last sleep on the fields they won in far-off South Africa.

It seems fitting that some permanent memorial should be erected to signalise our recognition of those who, as representatives of Prince Edward Island, bore a manful part in the great struggle, and especially of those who have fallen, that their names may be preserved and venerated in the years to come. With this object in view, and counting upon a hearty and liberal public response, THE GUARDIAN has decided to open A Patriotic Monument Fund, the proceeds of which will be devoted to the erection of a memorial in Charlottetown to our fallen heroes. It was in this city that Roland Taylor and Alfred Riggs had their home; it was here that they were best known and loved, but they and their brave comrades represented the entire Province, and the Capital City seems on all grounds the fittest place to signalise their patriotic sacrifice in an enduring form.

We have as yet no public monuments in Charlottetown. Those of our readers who have visited St. John have seen there the splendid monument erected some years ago on the principal square in front of the Court House at a cost of thousands of dollars to Frederick Young of Charlottetown, who perished in a brave effort to rescue another from drowning. Thus a distant Canadian city has honored a brave and worthy citizen of the Island Capital, and we feel assured that the people of this Province will think it an honor and a privilege to contribute to a like memorial, on our own soil, to our own brave soldiers who have fallen on the field of victory for their Queen and country.

Such a monument, standing ever in the

view of the living in our most populous centre, will do honor to all who fought and endured, whether they survived or fell. Those who gaze upon it in our day or in future generations will recall the splendid achievements of the Canadian Contingent in the hard conflict at Paardeberg, in the long and arduous marches, the well tried endurance that marked their progress from De Aar to Pretoria. Such a monument standing in our midst will be a source of provincial pride and a perpetual incentive to patriotism. We feel assured that our readers will desire to make it worthy of our brave Island soldiers, worthy of a great epoch in Canadian history and worthy of this loyal Island Province.

Subscriptions will be received at this office in sums small or large, and will be duly acknowledged. When a substantial amount has been collected a committee of representative men will be formed to select a design and arrange for the erection of the memorial. We trust that collections may begin immediately. The attention of school-teachers, of fraternal and benevolent societies as well as of all public spirited and patriotic citizens is specially directed to this Fund. The proceeds of public concert and other entertainments may very properly be devoted to this patriotic and worthy object.

The Halifax Herald, which has been instrumental in collecting some \$25,000 for the Indian Famine and Patriotic Funds, now makes an appeal to the Nova Scotia school teachers and children in behalf of a Memorial Fund for the fallen heroes of that Province who served in South Africa. The Herald is doing good service in this way, and its latest announcement is in the same line as was decided upon months ago by THE GUARDIAN in regard to the Islanders who have fallen in the war. Like the Herald we waited until our boys were about to return as the fittest time to place this worthy object before our readers.
