ISLANDER WOUNDED FOR SECOND TIME

An official telegram has been received that Sgt. Prescott Forbes of Tye Valley has been entered at No. 2 Australian General Hospital, Winerene, wounded in the shoulder. This is the second time Sgt. Forbes has been wounded. In the spring he was buried by a high explosive shell when in the front line of trenches at Ypres. A month after he was wounded he was back again in the firing line. It is to be hoped that this wound will not be any more serious than the first.

HEAVY FIGHTING REPORTED

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Although the Rumanians continue to gain ground against Austria Germans at various points in Transylvania the situation in Dobruja which has awakened added interest since the crossing of Danube into Bulgaria by Rumanian forces, remains uncertain. Bucharest says that violent fighting continues all along the line. South of the railroad running from Constanza to the Danube with the Teutonic Allies offering stubborn resistance to Rumanian and Russian forces. Nothing is vouchsafed however concerning the troops which invaded Bulgaria.

Sofia says that several Battalions of Rumanians made their way across the river. Berlin reports the destruction of Pontoon bridges over which they made their passage.

An official despatch from Rome asserts that field marshal Von Mackensen has ordered the evacuation of the Dobruja fortresses of Silistria and Turkukal recently captured by the Dobruja fortresses of Silistria being enveloped by Rumanians. Heavy rains are interfering with the activities of the British and French Armies in the Somme region of France but nevertheless Paris records the capture of an important trench north of Rancourt and the taking of additional prisoners while London says fighting at Eaucourt Dabbee is proceeding satisfactorily.

Violent fighting has been in progress in Russia, west of Lutsk, in Galicia, in the region of Zlota Spire. In the latter region, according to Petrograd, neither the Russians nor the Teutonic Allies have been able to gain any marked advantage. According to Petrograd the Russians made advances but Berlin reports that all attacks were repulsed. The Russians suffering exceptionally heavy casualties. In attacks says Berlin which were proceeded by terrific bombardments the Russian guard made 17 successful onslaughts and another division 12. As regards the fighting in Macedonia, Sofia admits that the heavy artillery fire of the Serbs in the region of Kaimakalin height caused the Bulgarians to withdraw to their Moglenia Valley in order to avoid unnecessary losses but asserts that the Entente attacks elsewhere along the front were repulsed.

Replica of Columbus' Flagship in Port

(Continued from Page One.)

At Chicago. The Government immediately appointed a Special Commission of Naval Architects and Archaeologists to carry out the plan. This Commission, after six months of most careful research, perfected their plans and as a result of their work gave to the world the Santa Maria, Pinta and Niña as they were.

The replicas are therefore historically correct. Particularly is this true of the Santa Maria. This same Commission placed on board the Santa Maria most of the relics now being exhibited.

The Santa Maria was built at the expense of the Spanish Government. The United States Government, Master Curtis having secured an appropriation for that purpose. He also had general direction of the enterprise.

Lieutenant W. McCarthy Little, U.S.N., had immediate charge of the ship, having been detailed as Naval Attache of the United States Legation at Madrid, Spain.

The first appearance of the replicas of the Columbus boats before the Spanish people occurred at Oviedo, Spain, October 10th to 14th, 1892, at the time of Spain's festivities in honor of the 400th anniversary of the World discovery by Columbus.

The boats went down the bay to meet the Queen of Spain as she approached from Cadiz, on the Royal Yacht, and were the greatest attraction at the celebration.

On February 18, 1893, the replicas of the fleet of Columbus started from Spain for America, and the placing of the boats on exhibition at the World's Fair at Antwerp, Belgium, of the United States Navy, manned by Union Jackies, conveyed by the U. S. cruiser Bennington. The Niña was commanded by Lieutenant Colwell, of the U. S. Navy, also manned by U. S. sailors, conveyed by the U. S. cruiser Newark.

The boats followed the course traveled by Columbus in the Fifteenth Century, stopping at the original landing place of Columbus. About the middle of March following, at Havana, Cuba, the Caravels Pinta and Niña were turned over to Spanish commanders and sailors, and so manned they joined the Santa Maria and participated in a number of important events prior to their arrival at the Columbus Exposition.

The replica of the original Santa Maria that made the eventful voyage in 1492 as the flagship of the Columbus fleet of three boats, was launched at the Navy Yard, Cadiz, Spain, June 26, 1892.

She made her first sea voyage July 29, of the same year, sailing to Palos, Spain. Her dimensions are: Length at the water line—71 ft., 3 in. Length over all—94 feet. Beam—25 feet, 8 inches. Depth of hold—12 feet, 5 inches. Draft—3 feet, 3 inches. Freshboard—5 feet. Displacement—233 metric tons (496 gross tons.)

The Santa Maria is very staunchly built. She has a 12x14 inch solid oak keel; she is double ribbed every 11 inches, each rib 5x9 inches, solid oak; she is sheathed outside with 3-inch planks of Spanish Fir.

The Santa Maria was a ship because of her size and deck arrangement, being the only one of the three boats composing the fleet of 1492 that had forecastle and cabin. It will be noted that her deck arrangement and shape would indicate that she was built for the purpose of attack and defence.

The Santa Maria has a bowsprit and three masts: Foremast, mainmast and mizzenmast. The mainmast is 90 feet high, and carries a mainyard 60 feet, 6 inches in length; a gallantyard 33 feet, 6 inches in length. Her Spritsail-yard is 26 feet, 6 inches; Fore-yard, 29 feet, 9 inches; Mizzen Lateen-yard (65 feet, 6 inches. At the top of the mainmast is a "Crow's Nest," 9 feet in diameter, 3 feet deep, in which the sailor on lookout duty was stationed. She carries under full sail 5,000 square feet of canvas, rigged in square and triangular sails, as follows:

Spritsail—Underneath the bowsprit. Used when under full sail. Fore-sail—Extending from foremast, and lashed to foreyard. Main Gallantsail—Lashed to mainyard in three sections, or "bonnets." (Reef points were not used in the days of Columbus, so to shorten sail, a section of sail or "bonnet" was taken off.) Top Gallantsail—Lashed to gallant-yard. Mizzen Lateen-sail—A triangular sail extending from the mizzenmast, and lashed to lateen-yard. Fore Staysail—Runs from jibboom to track of foremast. Is used in a storm.

It is due the Santa Maria to say that under full sail she is a most inspiring sight. All the sails have been ship-decked back to Chicago.

The armament of the ship consists of four Lombarda cannon of 2 1/2 inch bore; six Falconets, 1 inch to 1 1/2 inch bore.

The curious old guns created great interest among the numerous visitors who visited the ship yesterday.

On the cruise of 1492 the Santa Maria carried a total of officers and men of from 56 to 70, according to different historians. This included the Admiral, High Constable, Chief Accountant, Comptroller, Royal Notary, Historiographer, and Linguist or Interpreter. These people were cared for on this small boat for a period of 70 days. Where did they find quarters? Of what did their provisions consist and where were they stored? It is stated that fresh water was carried in wooden tanks built down in the hold of the boat, the tanks replenished by catching rain water on sails spread about the boat. But of the provender nothing is said. One can easily conclude that they were not given two course dinners.

The crew of the present Santa Maria numbers only five men as follows: Captain—Bob J. Cook, New London, Conn. Mate—Robert Ozers, Oklahoma. Steward—Lester Thompson, Stonington, Conn. Seaman—James M. Mooney, Somerset, Kentucky and Bill Drissler, Indianapolis, Indiana. The vessel will likely sail today.

It was a gold ring set with a large emerald. In the center of this stone, which had been hollowed out for the purpose, a ruby surrounded by tiny diamonds was set.

Phillip II of Armada fame, was its first possessor, and the subsequent defeat of his mighty ships by Drake and Raleigh marked the first decline in Spanish power.

The history of the ring is one long record of disaster to those who had it in their personal possession. At last, just about the time of the Spanish-American war, it was presented to a ground. Next it was put in a museum which was twice struck by lightning. King Alfonso and the Queen are not likely to be troubled in any way by its malign influences, for nowadays the ring, shut up in a strong box, lies buried very deep in the earth, and there it is likely to remain.

Another unlucky ring was once in the possession of the Spanish royal family.

Since the time of the Elector of Brandenburg every ruler of the house of Hohenzollern has, when dying, handed a sealed packet to his successor, containing the ring which is supposed to confer success and good fortune to its possessor.

The legend is that the black stone was originally dropped by a large load on the bed of the wife of the Elector immediately after the birth of her son. It was very carefully preserved, and the father of Frederick the Great had it set in the handsome ring which it now adorns.

The Kaiser loved to parade the "luck of the Hohenzollerns" on all state occasions, and doubtless he has lost it on one of his flying visits to his different war staff at the front.
