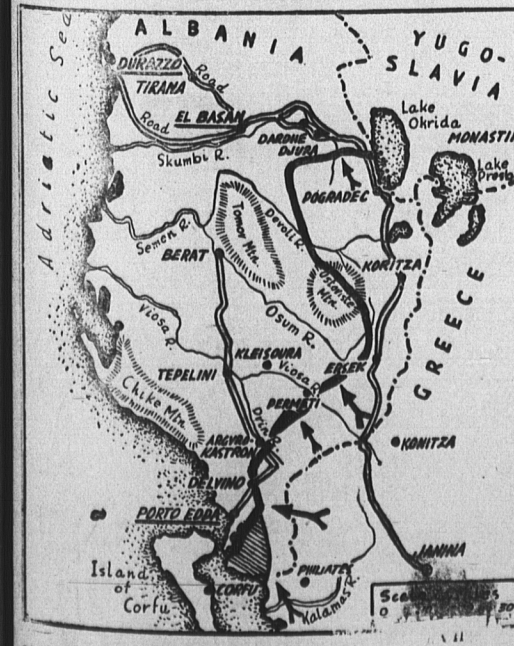

The Greeks speak jubilantly about conditions on the northern front, where their troops have advanced about 20 miles beyond Pogradee. Only advanced Greek forces then had reached the front shown to the west of Lake Ochrida. The map shows the battlefront fairly accurately, with the exception of the extreme south of the front, which seems to have been pushed northward until it parallels the Porto Edda-Delvino road. A Greek drive westward 2 cm Ker tza over the Ostrovite mountain to straighten the battle-front and menace Klisoura is desirable. Mountain gorges and the absence of roads have the effect of isolating the central and southern fronts from the northern front.
