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CANDIDATES FOR THE LEGISLATURE

Nominated at the Party Conventions Held Yesterday Afternoon.

At the Liberal Convention at Eldon, yesterday, F. L. Hazard, K. C., and David Irving, M. L. A., were nominated to contest the Belfast District at the coming local election. Addresses were given by the candidates and Richard Smith.

At the Liberal Convention at Georgetown, yesterday, W. W. Jenkins, Georgetown, and Dr. Morris, Dundas, were nominated to represent the Liberals in the coming local election. In case of Dr. Morris not consenting to run, George Jamieson, Sturgeon, will be the candidate.

DISCOVERS IMPORTANT RECORD.

OTTAWA, October 18.—On his recent trip to the far north, A. P. Low found at Beechy Land, Lancaster Sound an important record left by the ship Gjos, of the Swedish magnetic pole expedition. It was dated the 27th of August, 1903, and said that the ship and party had gone down Peel Sound to winter as near as possible to the magnetic pole. Low brought away the record which he has handed to the government. A copy will be sent to the Swedish government.

EASTERN TRAIN SERVICE.

Now is a good time to think over and settle our eastern train service for the winter months. There is need of two trains daily each way. We shall perhaps be told that the business will not warrant the expense. Business does not warrant the expense of all the trains running on the Intercolonial. There are many public services that do not yield an immediate cash return. Train service that will accommodate the people always develops business. The more frequent trains will also keep the track clear during and after storms and so save money.

We feel sure that Mr. Hughes would like to oblige his constituents in this matter. The Government, with vast projects for expenditure in the west, ought now to be not only just but generous to Prince Edward Island. This matter ought to be settled before the winter timetable is made up. It ought to be settled before the election. It is a needed public service and ought to be provided for. Hitherto there has been no portion of the Government Railways in Canada so meagerly served in winter as the eastern section of the P. E. Island Railway. The matter is one for the people who are to be served, between Charlottetown, Georgetown and Souris, to have settled if they can within the next two weeks.

THE STATION—THE EXTENSION.

There ought to be something doing at once in the matter of selecting a site and building the new railway station for Charlottetown.

The railway track ought certainly to be extended to the Plant Line wharf before the winter steam service begins.

The money is voted for these improvements. Both are urgently needed. We ask the Government not to make a "cup of Tan'alus" of these works.

There is no reasonable excuse for delay. The Government candidates, Messrs Warburton and Erowse, should let the public know where they stand on these matters.

Mr Horace Hazard, whose energy and business ability solved the telegraph question—for which let all credit be given—left these other matters ready to their head, with the money voted.

Further delay means suspense, anxiety and suspicion of bad faith. Let the public know where we are at.

Mr. Blair's resignation has not altered the merits and demerits of the respective party measures and policies.

When one reads of election bets it is well to remember that this form of gambling is frequently indulged in for political effect, and the money put up may be campaign funds.

The de-patch on another page containing a brief editorial from La Presse of Montreal on Mr. Blair's resignation is of interest as giving the views of a leading organ of French Canadian opinion which after supporting Sir Wilfrid Laurier during the past four years has suddenly come under a new proprietorship. It comes to The Guardian not from our regular correspondent, but as a news item. The essence of it is that La Presse invites Mr. Blair to explain himself and air his views on the platform or in the press. The St. John Telegraph, which appears to speak for Mr. Blair in New Brunswick, says "he will stamp the country again to the G. T. P. scheme."

FARM TO SOUTH AFRICA.

JOHANNESBURG, October 17.—Alfred Belt has presented to the government for educational purposes the Frankenveld farm twelve miles from here, which is valued at £80,000.

The farm possesses the features of advanced agricultural science. A reservoir has been built on the Willocks principle, and across the Jokeskei river there is a mealie mill in full working order and plant for the treatment of timber, producing poles, for which there is a great demand from the mines.

Eight hundred acres are under plantations, and 200 are laid out in vineyards, orchards and nurseries.

Mr. Belt's original offer was conditional on the government acquiring an adjoining estate costing £20,000 after which he undertook to spend £10,000 in increasing the area of the farm, bringing the total up to 2,000 acres and enabling farming to be carried on in all its branches, including a dairy farm and a veterinary school.

The government accepted the proposal with gratitude.
