MAN'S HOME IS WHERE HIS HEART IS
LONDON, Dec. 15.—(By The Canadian Press)—“Where is home?” This question was raised in the Divorce Court recently in a case concerning the domicile of Herbert Owen Fowler, who was suing for divorce from his wife on the ground of alleged desertion.
