Ottawa Wins Opener In Junior Hoop Series

OTTAWA, May 10 (CP)—Ray LeFebvre's University of Ottawa cagers uncorked a burst of power to night to take the first game of a two game total point series for the Canadian junior basketball title from the Saint John team 47-15.

Coach Doug Costello of the Mariners saw fit to ask the Canadian Amateur Basketball Association to throw the game out, however, and Ottawa officials are waiting word from A. L. Ryan of Toronto, vice president of the Association.

Costello was far from satisfied with the refereeing of Len Sevens

and George Gilmour both of Ottawa, and also complained that the timer went about his duties contrary to C.A.B.A. rules.

Costello also complained that the officials failed to give satisfactory answers on several occasions when rulings were questioned by the visiting team. The game was fast if not so ooth, with the Ottawans showing more polish and shooting ability.

The Saint Johns were able to meet the pace set by University of Ottawa, but could not match the local team's shooting.

lack. The main Axis worry is this: Is the remainder of the 8th still in the Ainalhoul sector, or have other units been withdrawn to the rear for regrouping and preparation for another stroke elsewhere—either in the final phase of the Cap Bon campaign or the initial phase of the new battle of Europe.

Communicate Vague
In recent days Allied communications have been vague about the 8th army, merely using brief sentences to the effect that active patrolling has continued on its front, with limited objectives and some prisoners taken. A small advance was reported today. There has been nothing in these communications to indicate the size of the British forces involved.

Briefly, here is how an intriguing doubleplay bet Sunday night. Montgomery and Gen. Anderson fooled the Axis.

The night just before dark the 8th army was all set for an attempt to smash through the strong forces facing it and take Tunis for Gen. Montgomery.

A few hours before zero time, Gen. Montgomery called his corps and division commanders together, told them the attack had been called off, and detailed a few units which were to join the 1st army 25 miles away.

These units were pulled out of the line and within an hour of joining the 1st army just about dawn, pushed to the front, advancing forces and stormed towards Tunis.

Axis Caught Off Base
The Axis, left with most of his armor and the major part of the 8th army was caught off base.

There wasn't even time to pull up the dormant force to meet the new threat because Tunis and Bizerte fell too quickly. So this strong and well equipped Axis force remains where it was, in imminent danger of being trapped and cut off from the sea.

Reports— and the absence of them put their fears to rest.

The Axis may also be wondering why Gen. Montgomery himself is not put their fears to rest.
