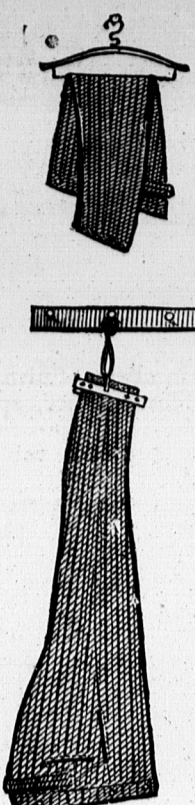

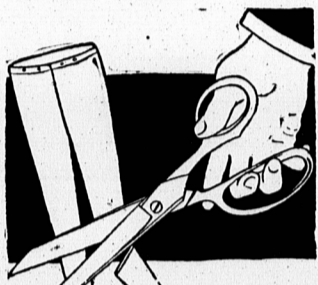

EXEMPTION FROM CIVIC TAXATION

Davis & Fraser will Probably Secure Ten Year Exemption from Council.

At a special meeting of the City Council held on Monday evening, September twentieth, last, called for the purpose of considering the advisability of making application to the Legislature for the exemption from taxation of the firm of Davis & Fraser who, intended commencing operations in the near future in the old Dominion Packing Company's Plant, the following resolution was moved by Councillor Rogers and seconded by Councillor Stewart:—

"Whereas, Davis & Fraser propose purchasing the property and plant of the Dominion Packing Company, and intend remodelling and modernizing said plant, and installing a new and up-to-date cold storage plant in connection with said property, for the public, and they have applied for exemption from the City Taxation on said property and plant and on their stock in connection with the said business to be conducted by them in said property and plant, for a period of ten years.

And whereas, this Council, under its present powers is unable to grant such exemption.

Resolved, that in the opinion of this Council, an application should be made to the Legislature of this Province at its next session, for the enactment of such an amendment to the Act of Incorporation as will enable it to make such exemptions in favor of said Davis & Fraser or any Company that may incorporate for working and operating said plant, provided a full statement of the nature and details of the business of the said company, showing the estimated capital engaged, the annual expenditure, the number of men to be employed, is furnished this Council, as a ground for making such application.

This motion, on being put, was carried.

SURGENS PUT LIFE INTO DEAD LIMBS

NEW YORK, Oct. 14—Two children who had lost the use of their legs through a tuberculous disease of the spine, which had also made hunchbacks of them, have regained the use of their limbs and are in a fair way to have normal backs again, as the result of having been encased in a new form of calot jacket, originated recently by physicians of the Hospital for the Cripple and Ruptured, at Forty-second street and Lexington avenue.

Both patients were thought to be incurable by the general practitioners who attended them previous to their treatment at the hospital. The success of the new device leads its inventors to expect great things of it in the future, as it is said to be now in little more than an experimental stage.

While the calot jacket is not new, being only a plaster of paris cast placed around the trunk, a new form of packing it has been adopted. The physicians use a plinth—or a piece of wood padded with felt and fastened against the spine so tightly as to make it immovable. The greatest possible pressure is brought to bear on the curvature compatible with comfort for the patient. In the old form of calot jacket it was explained by one of the physicians last night, perfect immovability for the spine could not be obtained, and that is the one thing required to cure the disease that causes the curvature and paralysis.

Augustus David Peck, of Stepey (Conn.) is one of the little patients who was benefited by the new device. He is seven years old, and up to six months ago was thought to be crippled for life. His legs were paralyzed and his spine had a pronounced curve.

Sister Rebecca, of the Episcopal came acquainted with him two years ago in Stepey. The physicians in the little Connecticut town said he could not live. He was such a sunny little fellow that Sister Rebecca determined to make an effort to save him. She enlisted the aid of friends and obtained enough money to bring the boy to the hospital here.

That was last May. He was put in a plaster cast and kept in the hospital for a short time. He gradually recovered—the use of his leg and the curvature of his spine was reduced one inch. Then he was sent home, still encased in the jacket. It became worn and recently it burst. Sister Rebecca brought him back to the hospital on Monday for a new jacket.

He was suspended by his chin, around which braces had been fastened, only the tips of his toes being allowed to touch the floor, and then the physicians wound around him 100 yards of gauze bandage that had been dipped in liquid plaster. His arms and legs were free, but his torso was swathed like a mummy.

The plinth was fixed in the back and held in place by straps passing over his shoulders. When the gauze dried it made a sheath in which his deformed spine could not budge. He probably will have to wear it two years, but by that time physicians think his back will be normal.

The other case is that of a little girl who was brought to the hospital ten days ago. She was affected just as was the little boy. Both her legs were paralyzed. She, too, was encased in a calot jacket and is now able to walk. The physicians think her cure more extraordinary than that of the boy. She is still in the hospital.

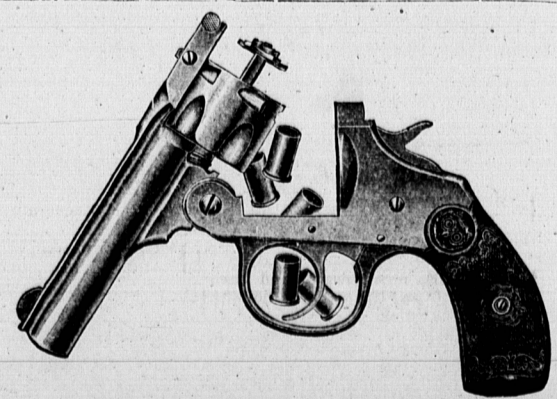
