Before the start of the season the Cub rooters in the Windy City figured that the home club could walk in with the pennant. But it isn't an easy matter to walk in with a pennant in a league which has other ball clubs like the Pirates, the Cardinals and the Giants.

the third corner was none too strong, but Mac has plugged up this gap by using McMillan instead of Beck pretty consistently. The pitching staff weakened late in May, and no team can win pennants without good twirling.

The Cubs may win a pennant or they may not win one. It is still a long way to go to the finish but one thing is certain. The Chicago team will be a menace all Summer long and, when the books are finally closed, you'll find that the hitting of Cuyler, Hornsby, Stephenson and Wilson has done a lot toward piling up victories for the Cubs.

Canadian Team Arrives in England

LONDON, June 20.—In fine condition and prepared to battle for the trophies they lost last year, the Canadian team for Bisley arrived in England today. The score or so of expert marksmen are participating in the National Rifle Association's great shooting meet at Bisley Camp Surrey, opening in two week's time.

On the youthful shoulders of Lieut. Desmond T. Burke of the Governor General Body Guard, Ottawa, rests the chief Canadian hope of capturing the classic of the meet for individual marksmen, the King's prize.

Lieut. Burke won this high award in 1924 and last year was a close second. In 1927 also he lost by just one point.

The two great team prizes, the Kolapore and MacKinnon cups, are also main objectives of the Canadians who held them for three years and one year respectively. Last year the Old Country team took the Kolapore Cup and Australia captured the MacKinnon Cup.

To-night the Annual Sports Banquet will be held at the Y. M. C. A. at 6.15. A lobster supper will be served by the ladies and a fine program has been arranged.

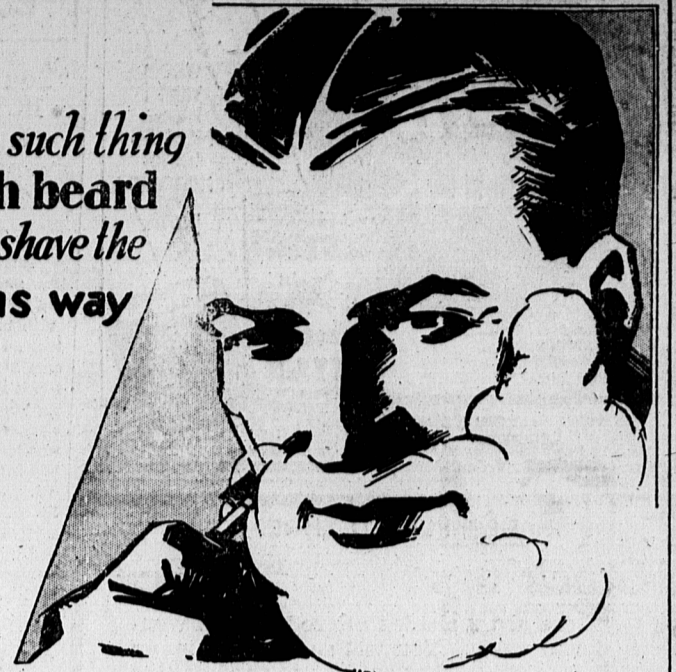
Each year a supper gathering is held, marking the closing of the Bowling for the season when the fortunate winners receive their prizes and the winning teams their medals and cups.
