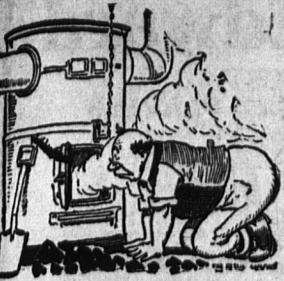

**RED CROSS WORK.**—The following is a brief report of the work done by the New Perth Branch of the Red Cross. This branch organized on Trafalgar Day, includes the different sections supplying milk to the New Perth Cheese Factory. At a meeting of the committees from each school district, held in New Perth on October 23rd, it was decided that the committees for each district should devise ways and means of getting such funds as should be required. Balthwin's Road had a special week realized \$29.50, cash collections, \$9.00. Of this amount, \$8.75 was handed in to the secretary of said branch. The balance was reserved to buy material for work. From this was made 66 pairs socks, 17 pillows, 13 cases, 21 suits pyjamas, 5 pairs wristlets. A quantity of old linen was also donated. Elletvalde donated 62 pairs socks, 9 pillows, 14 sheets, 24 pillow cases, 1 woollen blanket, 2 pairs light-weight blankets and a quantity of old linen. Summersville had a social which realized \$17.50, cash collections, \$10.00. Of this amount \$12.55 was handed in to the secretary. The balance was reserved to buy material from which was made 21 pairs socks, 11 suits pyjamas, 9 pairs wristlets, 1 pillow and cases. A quantity of old linen was also donated. Alberry Plains—Cash collections, \$15.00. \$10.00 was handed in to the secretary in cash. The balance was reserved to buy material from which was made 20 pairs socks, 1 pair mittens and 4 suits pyjamas. Greenfield: Cash collections, \$15.05. New Perth: Cash collections, \$32.25, donations, \$1.00. \$14.00 of this amount was kept to buy material. From a spinning frolic and bean supper, \$16.00 was realized, spinning frolic and social, \$16.20. With this money 100 lbs. rolls, 500 yards flannelette and cotton were bought. Part of this material was sold to the other districts. From the balance was made 52 pairs socks, 15½ suits pyjamas, 12 night shirts. Besides, 14 pairs socks, 8 pairs wristlets and 4 pillows and cases were donated. Trafalgar Day contributions from New Perth Dairy Company, \$75.00.
