Mrs. Thomas Andrew and daughter, Miss Nellie, St. Eleanor's, returned last evening from Wolfville, N. S.

The outward cargo by the steamer Ryhope, from Summerside this morning will include 2000 bags oats and 40 tons of hay.

A lengthy notice referring to the death of John Tanton which took place at St. Eleanor's on May 17th, appears in last week's Wesleyan.

The schooner Lizzie Catherine has been loaded by R. Campbell & Sons, Summerside, with a full cargo of hay, oats and potatoes for Campbellton, N. B.

The steamer Campana was in Summerside early this morning on return to Montreal. Her cargo from here consisted of about 600 bags of potatoes, 200 cases of lobsters and 20 tons of hay.

A silver grey, female fox and two cubs arrived in Summerside Saturday evening by express, and were sent same evening by western train to Lct Ten. The cubs were dead, cause of death unknown.

Dr. Tanton, Summerside, has purchased the dwelling house on the Armory ground, opposite the Post Office, and is moving, and placing it on a lot on Summer St., opposite Ex-Mayor Compton's residence.

Rhodes & Currie's Gasoline Yacht "Millicent" of Amherst, N. S., arrived Saturday evening on a pleasure trip. She is a handsome boat, and had quite a number of passengers on board. She sailed outward Sunday afternoon.

The late Dr. John T. Hardy whose death was reported in The Guardian a few days ago was born at Freetown. He removed with his parents to Summerside when about four years of age. His father the late Root Hardy was police officer for many years in Summerside. The last time Dr. John visited the Province was at the close of his studies at Ann Arbor, Mich. He rode his bicycle from Ann Arbor to Pt Du Chene although at that time he was a strong vigorous young man, the journey was too much for him, and he never fully recovered from the exposure and fatigue of it. A few years later curvature of the spine developed, and later on other complications set in which proved fatal.

In the Supreme Court of Summerside, yesterday, the case of Morrison vs. the W. and S. Commissioners was concluded, with the exception of the judges charge to the jury, which will be given when court resumes this morning.

Regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council, was held in the council chamber last evening, the Mayor and all the councillors being present. Bills to the amount of \$978, were read, passed, and ordered paid. Councillor McLellan brought up the matter of laying of the concrete sidewalk, around the market building. After some discussion it was decided not to proceed with this work at the present time. A communication was read by the Mayor from the Ryhope, asking for two new hose carts, it was decided to purchase the carts at a cost of \$100 each. J. V. Callbeck, on behalf of the milk vendors then addressed the Council asking if it was their intention to enforce the bye law, requiring all sellers of milk to have their cattle inspected, and if so to have the time extended until July. After a short discussion on the subject he informed that it was the intention of the council to carry out this bye law, but that they were willing to give any reasonable extension of time and to assist the owners of milk cows in any reasonable way possible. There being no other business of importance the Council adjourned.

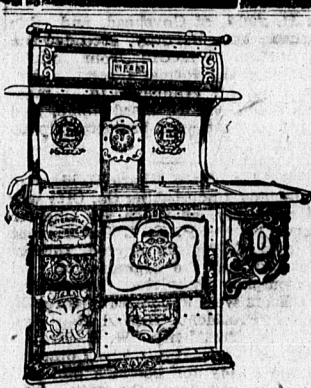
