GLACE BAY, Dec. 22. (Special) - On Saturday five men, Angus Macneil, James MacLe, David McDougall, Benj. Adey and Nicholas Pallpost were scalded by a boiler explosion at No 2 Colliery.

The Terrible Death of a Man Carried Over Rawtucket Falls

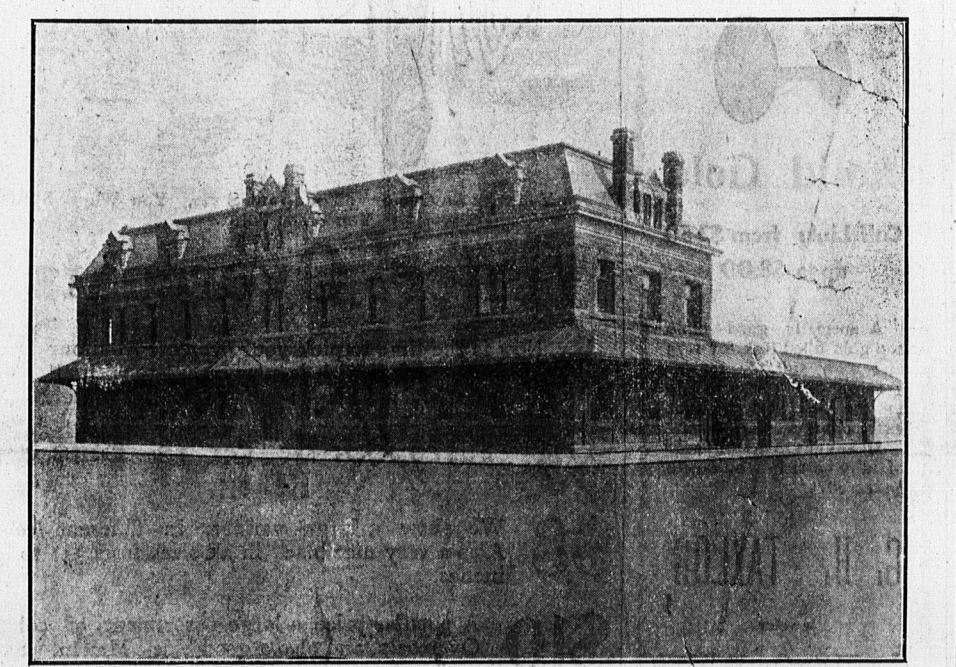

YAQUI INDIANS CAPTURE AND KILL 12 MEXICANS

NOGALES, Briz, Dec. 21. - Information which has just reached here, tells of the murder of twelve men by a band of 150 Yaqui Indians, forty-five miles southeast of Madagale, state of Sonora, Mexico, last Wednesday. P. J. McIntyre and a party of mining men of this section viewed the bodies of the murdered men. The Yaquis captured the party of 13 men. Among the number was Jose Fernandez, son of President Fernandez of the town of Cuernavaca, and owner of the Mesael plantation, on which the killing occurred. The others were Mexican laborers on the ranch and some Canadian miners looking for work.

LONDON TIMES STRONG FOR THE ALL RED SCHEME

PRIESTS EFFORTS RESTORE PEACE IN TEHRAN

TEHRAN, Dec. 21. - Another quick change in the situation at the Persian capital, has been brought about by the action of the priests, who with the promise that a satisfactory solution of the crisis will be found, have induced the opposing sections to disperse a second time. The tents on Artillery Square however, are left standing, so as to be ready for use in case of a sudden recall to arms.

PETERSBURG, Dec. 21. - Irritated at the testimony given at the trial of General Stoessel by General Kuropatkin yesterday, Count Witte has addressed a letter to the court begging an opportunity to appear on the witness stand. General Kuropatkin's testimony was to the effect that before the war with Japan he had recommended the abolition of Port Arthur and the restoration of the King Tung Peninsula to the Chinese.

REPORTED FIRE AT ALBERTON ROGERS PROPERTY

A rumor was in circulation last night in this city that there had been a big fire in Alberton, destroying the Rogers property there - but owing to the fact that the telegraph and telephone lines to Alberton were both closed it was impossible to learn particulars.
