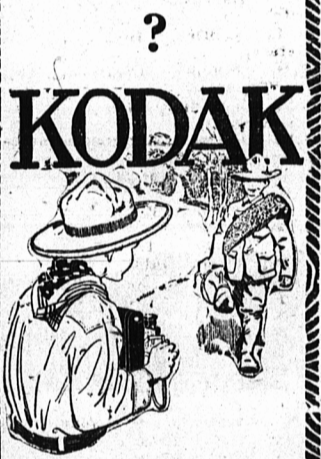

CONDITIONS OF \$1,000 PRIZE.—The conditions under which the McCharles Scientific Prize of \$1,000 is to be awarded have been announced. This prize is open to Canadians who have discovered or invented any new and improved process for the treatment of Canadian ores or minerals, or for any device that will lessen dangers of electricity in supplying power and light, or for any marked public distinction achieved by any Canadian in scientific research in any useful practical line. Communications in connection with this award should be received not later than Sept. 1, 1916, by the secretary of the McCharles Prize Committee, University of Toronto.

New Glasgow News.—J. W. H. Sutherland was in Moncton on Thursday and made a contract with the General Fuel Agent of the Intercolonial Railway to supply schooner at Pictou and Sydney to carry some 18,000 tons of coal to P. E. Island ports for the P. E. Island Railway. Some coal is now being shipped from the Acadia pier at the Landing, but the intention is to ship the bulk of it via the Abercrombie pier of the Intercolonial Coal Mining Co., Ltd. Most of the coal will be obtained from the Intercolonial and Acadia Companies, and Mr. Sutherland insisted that such coal be taken from those companies over and above the contracts now arranged for I. C. R. requirements.
