Big Reception For 2nd Battery Sunday Afternoon

(By The Canadian Press) - HALIFAX, Sept. 27 - Military authorities announced today that a big reception will be held for the 2nd Battery of the Royal Canadian Artillery, which is being transferred to the parent city of Charlottetown.

The Army said that while the unit was made up of 170 Nova Scotians and 36 Prince Edward Islanders it was included in the Victoria Cross and Canadian Division draft with the understanding that the unit as a whole would proceed to its parent city.

When the Battery boys arrive at Charlottetown by special train at 10 o'clock Sunday afternoon, they will be greeted by approximately 100 former members of the unit who preceded their homecoming by train bearing the unit's colors.

His Honor Lieutenant-Governor J. A. Bernard will personally greet the boys at the station and will be accompanied by the Hon. J. Walter Jones, Premier, members of his Government, civic authorities, relatives of the men and thousands of the province's citizens gathered to witness the big ceremony.

At Market Square - After arrival on Market Square the unit will line up in the space enclosed, and Brigadier J.C. Stewart, C.B.E., D.S.O., District Officer of the province, will preside.

Decorations - Citizens of the city have already been asked to decorate their homes and businesses with flags and bunting and government buildings are setting the example.

The Provincial Building, City Hall and Market Building are being prepared now, with a reception tent being built in Market Square here; special accommodations for relatives of the returning men are being made at the Hotel Windsor.

The total number being welcomed will include 180 members of other provinces and 33 Islanders in the Battery. In addition, 200 civilian personnel from other units who are coming home on the same boat will be present.
