Legislative Assembly

RULES RELATING TO PRIVATE BILLS

58. All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

59. No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a Petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such Petition must be signed by the said parties.

60. A Committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every session consisting of five members, of whom there shall be a quorum, to be denominated "The Private Bills Committee" to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such committee has reported thereon to the House.

61. As soon as the committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the committee shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading, if deemed necessary by the committee.

62. No Bill for the particular interests of any persons, Corporation or Corporations, or body of people, shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

63. No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body Corporate the title to any tract of land, shall be received or read in the House, unless before the opening of the Legislature at least four weeks' notice, containing a full description of the land in question, has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons, Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill. A copy of this order shall be published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper under the signature of the Clerk of the House for four consecutive weeks in November and December in every year.

WHO'S WHO IN THE STORY

Evelyn Haste, beautiful and rich girl, who sits down at the piano on her wedding night—and mysteriously disappears.

Kennedy Haste, her husband, who suspects complicity on the part of his old war comrade.

Sir Rawdon Wells, an amateur scientist, who has insisted on lending the couple Hidden Hall Court, his gloomy and mystery-ridden estate, for their honeymoon, and who is found after the disappearance in a secret chamber.

Pandora, a gipsy-like girl, adopted sister of Kennedy and secretly in love with Wells.

Miss Gillett, an ex-war nurse, who fell in love with Haste in a hospital and who is an intense person.

Dagon, youthful Scotland Yard detective, who has done glorified "spy work" in the war. He is of vivid Latin temperament, though Canadian in training.

Sluicing "the Unknown"

There they all stood, side by side on his desk, and Dagon apostrophized them in the intervals between jotting down "second thoughts" in his new notebook with a stylographic pen.

Under the heading of Sir R. W. he had already scrawled several paragraphs; but he knew his notes by heart, and there was no need to refresh his mind by reading them over.

"Whether or no R. W. had any hand in the disappearance of Evelyn, he had forgotten some important papers which he needed to take with him to America. This I don't believe. Too obvious an excuse! Says also that being on the spot he thought it well to burn a lot of things which were no longer of any use. I do believe he burnt the things, but not because they were not of use.

"Now what would happen to R. W. if it could be clearly proved that he had lured Mrs. Haste into some secret trap in his own house, killed her, and attempted to cremate her body in a furnace?"

"He would, of course, be hanged. Was enough evidence built up against R. W. to convict him?"

"If the skeleton hadn't turned out to be that of a man, thus suggesting a trick, there might have been enough provided that the girl

Pandora Haste had not taken the guilt upon herself by bringing forward several proofs.

"Pandora Haste. Is she capable of killing or kidnaping the wife of her adopted brother, as she intimates that she has done?"

"Possibly she might kill in a moment of rage. Any hot-headed person might do that. She could do nothing of the sort in cold blood. Kidnaping must be carried out in cold blood, therefore P. H. did not kidnap Eve."

"If P. H. lied, why did she? Dashed if I can see any motive except love for R. W., and a wish to save him at any cost to herself."

"Would a girl make such a sacrifice for a man known to be in love with another woman? If she would, she'd be an unusual kind of girl. Most women will do anything for the men who love them, and jolly little for those who don't. Still less for those head over ears in love with some one else."

"Even if P. H. was willing to damn herself for the sake of R. W., doesn't that mean she knew the proof against him was overwhelming, and that without help from outside he was surely lost? That's the way the thing appears to me at present, which pretty well means she must have been acquainted with other facts that would look black against R. W.—facts that haven't yet come out in evidence."

"The disappearance of Pandora Haste, to escape would be to contradict herself. She had herself arrested, let's say, because she wished for one reason or another to be thought guilty of doing away with Eves Carroll, as she put it. Why, then, vanish before she'd had time to establish her own guilt in the kidnapping?"

"If she was the man or woman responsible for Eves's disappearance or death did the trick. He—or she—wanted R. W. to be convicted, and feared the scheme would fail because of P. H. if she stuck to her guns."

"The Unknown. Who is this person who wants R. W. convicted, if, possible, hanged? Is there such a person at all?"

"Is it likely that motive would be a desire for revenge for some injury, or for advantages to be gained by R. W.'s death?"

"This is the big question, Dagon old thing, you've got to find the answer. If you can find it, you may also find Pandora Haste. Also Eva Carroll, if she lives."

"Acts of the Unknown (taking for granted that such a person exists):

Nearly All Loot From Hochelaga Bank Recovered

LACHINE, Que., Feb. 10.—Nearly \$3,500 of the \$4,800 robbed from the Ste. Anne De Bellevue branch of the Bank of Hochelaga on Jan. 28th when Mr. Boyer, the Manager was knocked unconscious by a burglar and bills to that amount stolen has been recovered according to Chief of Police Georges Durocher today.

Hidden away underneath a shed at the rear of a house near the marketplace, the money was discovered by Elzear Benoit Saturday, said Mr. Durocher.

Young Benoit first stumbled on a packet of dollar bills in the vicinity of the shack and at once informed his father, who telephoned the police. A search was immediately commenced for the remainder of the loot.

After some hours work, other packages of bills were unearthed under the shed, the whole amounting to \$3,498.

Chief Durocher believes that the robbery at Ste. Anne De Bellevue was the work of a "greenhorn." No one experienced in crime, he said, would bury the fruits of his thieving in the snow under the floor of an out-house.

France Cools Under Spirit of Brit. Vote

PARIS, Feb. 10.—Twenty-four hours reflection has somewhat toned down the warmth with which the British note on debts was received in Paris. The sincere good will and conciliatory spirit shown in the Churchill note is still fully recognized and its acceptability as a basis for discussion is not questioned, but various passages are found to be vague and obscure, requiring elucidation before a reply can be made.
