At a meeting of the Board of Trade held Friday night at Souris, it was decided to ask the Railway Department to have the railway wharf close piled before the new dredge was set to work there. It was unanimously decided to oppose any extension of the franchise to the Telephone Company until the line is extended to East Point, and another line via St. Peter's, established with Charlottetown. THE SECOND DAY OF THE "GOOD SEED" MEETING AT SOURIS, Thursday, almost surpassed the first. About 20 young men and old took the classes in selection of seed oats. In the afternoon the identification of Weed Seeds was taken up. A great deal of interest centered in the competitions. Two samples of white oats, one not well cleaned and with a good deal of black oats in it and quite a lot of spurry, and the other well cleaned but darkened by weathering and to which some seeds of Rill Grass and Ox Eye Daisy were added were given each competitor to score. Newman, the gentleman in charge, and a man who has had a great deal of experience in this work not only in Canada, but also in the United States, pronounced the quality of the work done as excellent, showing they had a good grasp of the principles of grain judging. In the practices given in this work much importance was attached to the presence of weed seeds and to the uniformity and general condition of the sample. In the competition in Weed Seed identification each competitor was given a mixture of eight different seeds, all of which had been taken up in the class, to name. The one who secured first place named seven out of the eight and quite a number named four or more. In all fifteen competed. The first prize was won by Verone McDonald. This work brought out many important points in connection with the selection of good seeds and should prove of great value to the farmers.—Monday and Tuesday "Good Seed" meetings will be held in Alberton. The attendance at first was small but grew larger and larger till the building was filled and additional seats had to be brought in to provide for the crush. The meetings were most encouraging to the visitors.
