Mr. Fred Pickard, 40, Charlottetown, well known island sportsman and proprietor of The Bike Shop was drowned yesterday off Brighton Shore.

The tragedy occurred about 2:30 p.m. when Mr. Pickard was rowing a punt to his outboard motor boat moored some distance off shore from his summer home. It is believed that Mr. Pickard toppled from the light craft when he reached for a drifting oar or when he was about to move the outboard motor.
