## Marks Shattered As Irishman Wins Qualifying Round

### Record Breaking Round Of 67 Gives Nolan British Open Medal - Somerville Places For First Round Today.

(By Frank H. King Associated Press Sports Writer.)

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 4.—Steaming in over the old course to shoot the final 18 holes of the 36-hole qualifying trial in just 67 strokes, William (Pat) Nolan, smiling Dublin Irishman, shattered all the centuries of St. Andrew's records and won the British Open Golf Championship medal today with a total of 71-67-138.

Byways of old St. Andrews tonight rang with the cheers for the feat of the Irish professional. The 66's of George Duncan and Bob Jones on former years were eclipsed, and even though the championship may not cross the Irish Sea, Scots, Britons and American joined in praising the Irishman's feat.

Behind Nolan followed 116 polished linksmen, invading O. R. "Sandy" Somerville, of London, Ont., holder of the United States Amateur title, who will start tomorrow in the first round of the championship proper.

Two Canadians were among the

best that fell foul of the sun blistered fairways and greens of the historical course. They were Jack Nash, London, and Don Anderson, St. Thomas, Ont. Nash had a total of 85-80-165 and the St. Thomas golfer, 87-81-168.

Somerville played a steadier brand of golf today than he did yesterday when a brace of sevens marred his card in the incoming nine. He was even fours on the outgoing journey today for a par-equaling 36. Homeward bound he faultered several times but remarkable recoveries that brought gasps of admiration from the gallery enabled him to turn in a 79-75 and total of 154.

Horton Smith, flashy Chicago pro, trailed Nolan by four strokes in second place with 71-71-142. Smith led the American contingent which had 13 survivors including Gene Sarazen, defending champion and co-favorite with Henry Cotton, the great English pro. The latter turned in a 77 today for a two-round score of 151.

## Falcons Go Into Tie With Rovers

### "Birds" Turned Back Stars 9 To 5 Last Night - Teams Much Improved In Field.

The Falcons flew into a tie with the northern Rovers for the leadership of the City Ball League and possession of the Chester A. Campbell Trophy at the Abegweit Grounds last evening when they turned back last year's titlists, the Stars, 9 runs to 5.

WIMBLEDON, England, July 4—(Canadian Press and Associated Press Cables)—A smashing five-set surprise victory by J. S. Olliff and I. H. Wheatcroft of Great Britain over the remaining United States doubles pair was the outstanding highlight of today's play in the annual Wimbledon Tennis Championships.

Olliff and Wheatcroft teamed beautifully to defeat Lester Stoefen and Clifford Sutter, 5-6, 2-6, 7-5, 11-9, 8-6, in a third round match. Wheatcroft, a giant of six feet five inches and heavily built, dominated the match with his fierce service and smashes, while Olliff played an artistic supporting game. Another interesting doubles

match saw the veteran French team of Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon defeat the brilliant young Australians, Jack Crawford and Vivian McGrath, 6-2, 6-2, 3-6, 6-2. Tomorrow the long awaited clash between Henry Cochet, of France, and Ellsworth Vines, of United States, will be played on the famed centre court, Jack Crawford, Australian star, who holds a straight set victory over Cochet this year, meets Hiro Hach, of Japan, in the other semi-final.

Cochet has already eliminated three Americans in the most serious and carefully mapped campaign he has fought at Wimbledon in years. The result is considered a toss-up but Crawford is considered to hold a wide edge on the Japanese ace.
