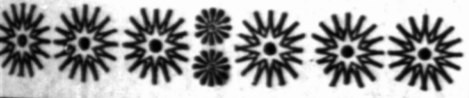

THE announcement of the definite retirement of Mr. H. C. McLeod from yacht designing and racing will be learned with much regret in yachting circles. He has had a large share of success as a racing skipper as well as a designer. The records here of his boats Mentor, L'ore and Dione have rarely been equalled anywhere. Col. Isaacson and Mr. McLeod have, however, purchased a crack cruiser, built by Arthur E. Payne, Southampton, England, called the Gloria, which last year won the "Coup de France" in the Mediterranean, and will take a deep interest in yachting.—Hx. Recorder.

Last Night's Lecture.

Marie Antoinette the illustrious but unfortunate Queen of France was the subject of Mr. Bartlett's lecture in St. James' Hall, last evening. A good audience was present who gave undivided attention for nearly two hours to the vicissitudes of a life which promised fair but ended disastrously. In commencing his lecture Mr. Bartlett said:—"Before we pass judgement on a life it is necessary to know something about the surroundings of that life in its youth, something of the persons entrusted with the education and training of that life. It would be unfair to compare the reign of Marie Antoinette with that of Victoria, when we consider that the latter came to the throne fresh from the hands of a mother fitted to mould her for the responsible and exalted position she was destined to fill; while the former had been left entirely to the care of hirelings, her mother, Marie Theresa, being too much absorbed with the affairs of the nation to give any attention whatever to the training of her children. Married at 15 to the weakest of his line of king (Louis XVI) and transferred from the court of Austria to that of France she was totally unfit for the position in which she found herself; a position where etiquette seemed to rule the nation, and she knowing nothing whatever of etiquette, and being woefully without tact was regarded with suspicion and distrust from the first. Beautiful she certainly was, all historians agree upon that point, in judicious she may have been, but wicked she never was. Courage was another element in her character for when the plot thickened round her and circumstances which she knew could only end in death drew near, even when she had opportunities to escape, she would not, she chose not to desert her husband, even though it meant the guillotine. She met death bravely at the age of 39 after suffering imprisonment and insult of every kind. She had endured the execution of her husband and had suffered separation, death to her mus: have been a release." Several views were thrown on the canvas among them being Louis XVI, Marie Theresa, the Dauphin and others. Before beginning his lecture Mr. Bartlett read a letter from Rev. T. F. Fullerton and one from Major Weeks. It is needless to say they were listened to with close attention. The audience was dismissed with the National Anthem.

The lecture throughout was thoughtful and evidenced the thorough acquaintance of the lecturer with his subject.
