Stock Markets At A Glance

TORONTO, May 2 (CP) - Following week starts the Stock Market perked up to show a substantial margin of gains over losses at the close today. Strength rested chiefly in the gold group which held an index gain of 1.52 at the finish while the Base Metal group was up .34 and the Western Oil .24.

CHICAGO, May 2 (CP) - May 2 jumped 2 1/2 cents at the opening of grain futures markets today but after the early flurry the trade quieted and most prices moved irregularly within fractions of yesterday's final quotations.

MONTREAL, May 2 (CP) - Reflecting investment faith in their post-war future, golds were sent to a new six-year high in the indices by traders today on the Stock Exchange and Ours Market. War news promoted a cautious attitude among investors towards other key groups and they were marked down in the averages.

WINNIPEG, May 2 (CP) - U. K. dealers were back in the market for Canadian wheat today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, being credited with purchases amounting to 3,000,000 bushels. Yesterday British buying was placed at 7,000,000 bushels.

NEW YORK, May 2 (AP) - Stocks closed irregularly lower in quiet dealings today, after extreme losses of more than a point in Steels, Motors, and Rails were pared to only fractional declines in late trading.
