TORONTO April 22.—If output of gold mines of the Porcupine and Kirkland Lake areas in Northern Ontario continues at the rate set for the first three months of 1931, production in Canada this year will reach a total not anticipated by expert statisticians for five or six years to come.

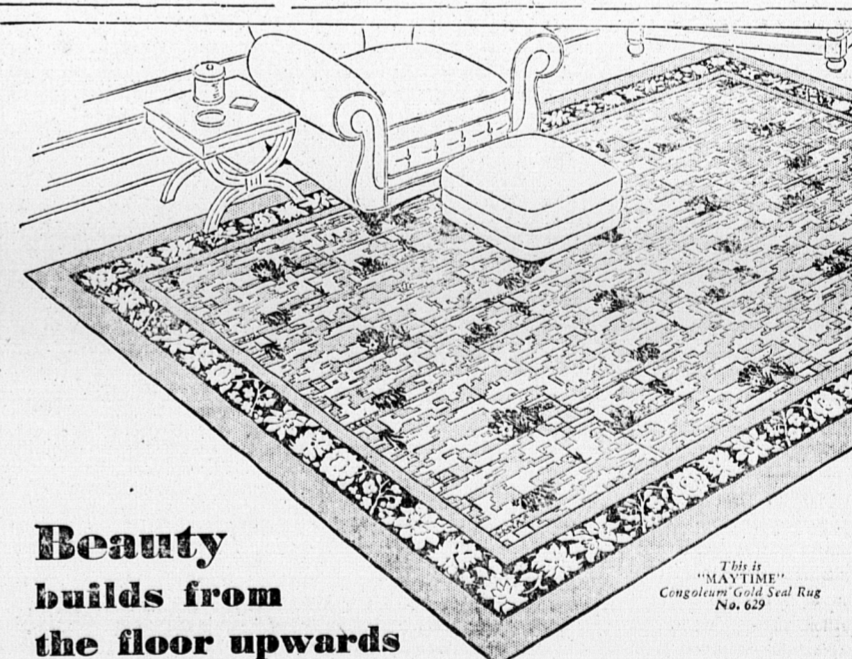
