BARGAIN HUNTER MUST REMAIN WED

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—Supreme Court Justice Gaff Saturday placed the stamp of his judicial approval on the harmlessness of "dementia bargain," otherwise known as the "bargain counter fever," of which some women exhibit such violent and alarming symptoms when passing a holiday store window. The Justice handed down this decision—epoch making from a feminine point of view—when he dismissed the suit started by Mrs. Henrietta Goodman to obtain an annulment of her marriage to Lazarus Goodman on the ground that she was insane when she took the marital vows.

Mrs. Bertha Belnick, Mrs. Goodman's mother, testified that her daughter had been confined in the Manhattan State Asylum previous to May, 1910, when she was freed as be
