Friends of Mrs. David Jones will be sorry to hear that she is confined to her bed for the last few days.


Mrs. Robert Enman has returned from Wheatley River, where she attended the funeral of her sister the late Mrs. Archibald Barrett.

**Chinese Troop May Withdraw**  
TOKYO, Dec. 14 (AP)—A dispatch to the newspaper Asahi from Tientsin, Manchuria, today said Marshal Chang Bueh-Liang plans to order the withdrawal within the great wall of the Chinese forces at Chinchow in anticipation of a more positive Manchurian policy from the new Inukai cabinet.

**Zanivorga Elected First President**  
MADRID, Dec. 12 (AP)—Niceto Alcali Zamora, sometimes called "Father of the Spanish Republic," was elected first constitutional president of Spain by the national assembly last night.

He received 362 votes out of a possible 466. Some deputies cast blank ballots, a few divided their votes among five other leaders and the rest abstained from voting.

The President-elect remained at home during the voting, in which his election was virtually a foregone conclusion.

The first to congratulate him were his wife and his two grown daughters.

"I'll try not to be a dictator during my tenure," said the President-elect, a farmer's son in an unpressed suit. He will take over the executive power in a gala inauguration today.

**ISLANDER DEAD IN TRENTON, N. S.**  
TRENTON, Dec. 11.—The death occurred last evening at 6.30 o'clock of James McGuigan, at his home, North Trenton, in his 30th year, being confined to bed the past three months.

Mr. McGuigan came to Trenton a number of years ago, where he was an employee of the Car Works and was held in high esteem by his fellow workmen.

He was born in Prince Edward Island and was the son of Edward McGuigan and the late Mrs. McGuigan. He leaves to mourn besides his father, two brothers, Vincent and Edward both of Trenton, and one sister (Annie) Mrs. Frank Marshall, Glenfalloch and his lonely widow, who before her marriage was Miss Bertha Davidson, of Guysboro.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

**WAR-DEBT PAYMENTS**  
LONDON, Dec. 14. (AP)—Announcement at Washington that war debt payments due next Thursday could be postponed were received in London political and financial circles with general satisfaction.

"Such an attitude about British-American war debts is all to the good," said Sir Josiah H. Stamp, one of Britain's foremost economists.

"America must realize it is a very vital matter at the present time; and it only wants consideration in an unprejudiced way to make a new step."

**To Regulate Working Hours**  
STRATFORD, Ont., Dec. 14.—(By The Canadian Press)—There are likely to be amendments to the factory act at the next session of the legislature, which will bring about modified hours for women working in factories, Hon. Dr. J. D. Monteith, Minister of Labor, stated here Saturday.

In regard to recent charges that child labor existed in the province, Dr. Monteith stated full investigation would be made. As for minors working in industries, he declared that the government was making an effort, as far as possible to regulate their hours, not only for the sake of the minors but to prevent the replacement of heads of families which might be in need of work.
