

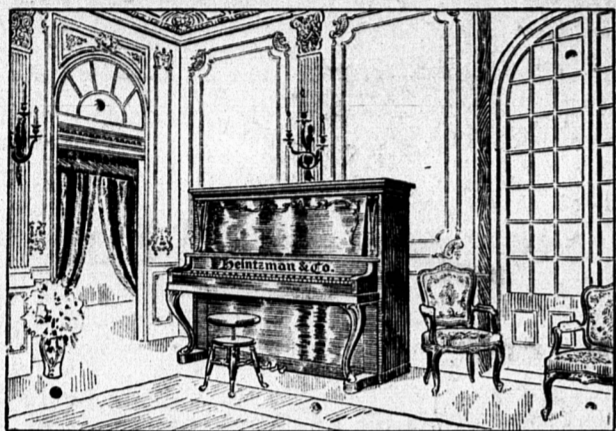

TO RECOVER POLL TAX.—The period within which the citizens of Charlottetown were to pay their poll tax, to enable them to vote at the Municipal election next year, has expired but there are still a number of persons who have not paid their poll, and the City authorities intend proceeding against them by process of law to recover the tax. Within the next few days the City Clerk will issue the first batch of executions against these defaulters; about twenty of them; and subsequently other executions will be issued from time to time.

CHURCH WORKERS' SOCIAL.—An enjoyable function took place in the schoolroom of Grace Church on Thursday night. It consisted of a social meeting of the men of Grace Church congregation. The object of the meeting, as explained by Rev. J. M. Marshall, the pastor, who presided, was to get the men in closer touch with each other in order that they may do more effective work for the church. An excellent supper was served by the Ladies' Aid Society, after which an interesting program of addresses, etc., was rendered. Dr. Ayers spoke on "The Sunday School"; Mr. J. D. Seaman on "The Adult Bible Class"; Mr. Ernest Duché on "The Splendid Reading"; Mr. G. R. Hutcheson on "The Church Choir"; Mr. James Carter on "The Quarterly Board"; and Mr. W. H. Johnson on "The Mission Work of the Church."

SUCCESSFUL SALES.—Within the last month, Messrs Benj. Carter and Co., have conducted fifteen very successful sales ranging from \$1,500 to \$8,000 each and still report eleven sales on hand. Mr. Carter said yesterday to a Guardian representative that "farming is in a better financial standing than ever before." Owing to fox ranching and other industries, the farmers seem encouraged to continue farming and seem to think it is the best calling in life. Never before have crop and stock brought such prices as they have this fall. One surprising feature is that cows, after milking all summer, are realizing from \$40 to \$60 which goes to show the demand. Oats in almost every instance sells at from 40 to 46 cents per bushel, turnips at 12 to 15 cents and potatoes at 25 to 30 cents as they have been picked in the field. Yesterday Mr. Carter sold three horses on the Market Square, realizing from \$80 to \$130 each. He leaves this morning for Lot 48 where he will conduct a sale for Mr. Henry Smallwood. Mr. Carter seems to be doing a big and deserving business in the line of auctioneering.

Through the courtesy of Mr. W. B. Prowse, a lover of chess himself, the club will meet every Friday evening in one of his rooms in the Prowse Block, Stanyside. All those who would like to play chess may become members of the club by paying \$1 subscription when duly proposed by present members. The club will meet on Fridays at 7.30 p. m. The usual series of tournament games will not commence until February or March, giving all an opportunity to practise in the meantime. The club gratefully acknowledges the promise of a trophy from Mr. J. J. Louson, of Montreal, who is also fond of the royal game and is well known by many in the province.
