GOOD ROADS DELEGATION.—Dr. H. H. Shaw, Provincial Engineer, leaves this morning for Ottawa, where he will represent Prince Edward Island on a delegation from all the Good Roads Associations in Canada, which is headed by Premier Verner, of New Brunswick and which has an appointment with Premier King and his Cabinet for Tuesday, February 24th. The object of the delegation is to seek further federal aid for the improvement of highways. Under the present grant that Province will have \$50,000 unappropriated and which can be made use of this year. Write away Mr. Shaw will be one of the representatives from P. E. Island on the Maritime delegation.

OPENING BRANCH.—A St. John Exchange says: Miss C. Madeline Jamlan, of Springfield, P. E. I., who has been in charge of the memory work department for Sunday schools of the Canadian Bible Society, is now in St. John in connection with the organizing of a similar branch of the society's work in this province. Miss Jamlan said that her work was taking very well with pastors of local churches and was greatly appreciated where no systematic memory courses were in use. Awards are given for the correct memorizing of certain passages in three classes as follows: Beginners, 4 to 6 years; a Gospel; primary pupils, 7 to 10 years; a Testament; intermediates, 10 to 15 years, an illustrated New Testament or Bible; seniors, 14 and older, a gilded Bible and a special certificate. There were more than 1,000 awards given in Prince Edward Island in the first year of the department's operation. This department was first suggested by W. S. Louson, president of the Prince Edward Island branch and proved a great success in this branch.
