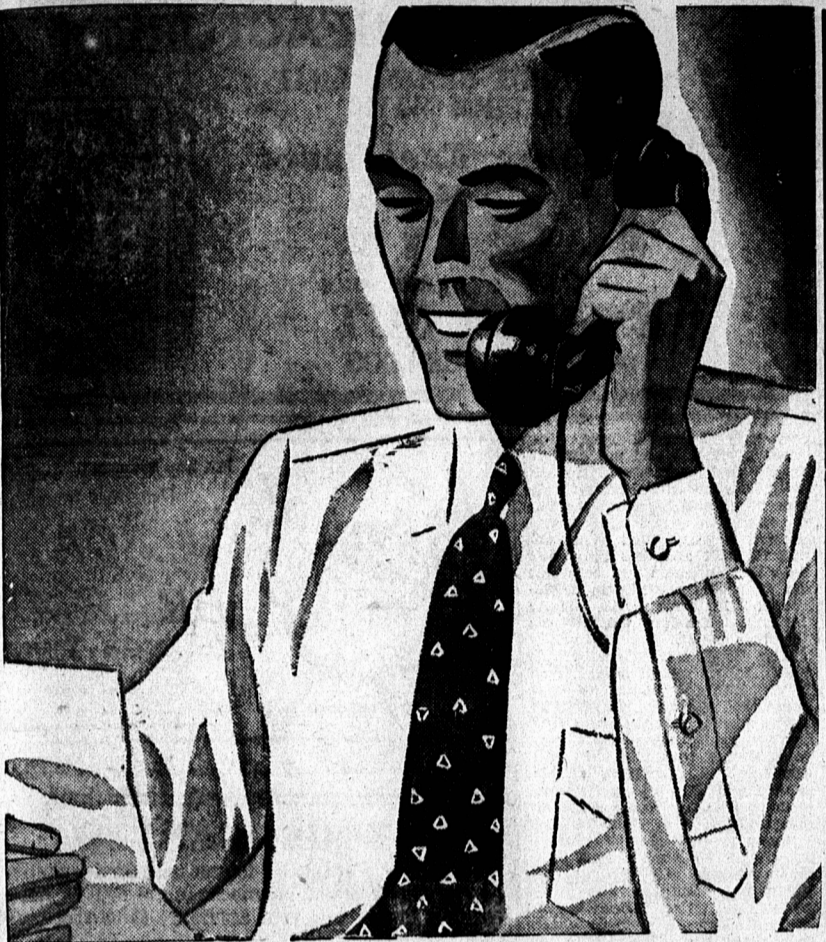

### Tributes to New Governor General

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 28.—Mingled with words of praise for John Buchan, next Governor General of Canada, the Senate today heard advocacy and opposition on the question of a Canadian as Governor General. Into the discussion was thrown the suggestion Lieutenant-Governors should come from provinces outside those to which they were appointed—Ontario and Quebec exchanging the east and west likewise—all to cement good-will and better understanding.

A brief announcement by Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen of the appointment of Mr. Buchan, to whom the Senate leader paid tribute in closing discussion, brought remarks from Senator Raulo Danurand.

Speaking for himself, the Liberal leader said in his advancing years he hoped to enjoy the pride and satisfaction of seeing a Canadian named Governor-General of Canada.

The statute of Westminster had established the Dominion's absolute equality with other parts of the British Commonwealth. And it would suggest to the King a Canadian as Governor-General as Australia had done a few years ago in the naming of Sir Isaac Isaacs.

He would have been happy, Sena-

tor Danurand said, to have heard the government had suggested the name of Sir Robert Borden, former Prime Minister; Sir William Mulock, Chief Justice of Ontario, or Sir Robert Falconer, retired President of the University of Toronto, from the post. At the same time, he added, he wished to express his appreciation of the high qualifications of Mr. Buchan.

Senator Roldolphe Lemieux (Lib. Montreal) agreed with the idea some day the Governor General should be a "full-blooded Canadian." However, Mr. King had been well advised in selecting a son of Scotland. The selection of Mr. Buchan was a credit to the mother country and to Canada. With two basic races in this country a Scotchman always had been a good interpreter between the English and the French and the appointment would be well received in all parts of the country, he added.

"I am looking forward," he said earnestly, "to increasing my Canadian friendships, and deepening my knowledge of the Dominion."

"As a historian I have always been fascinated by the romance of Canada's history and her wonderful development in recent years, and I shall count it a special privilege to see at close quarters her handling of the new problems she has to face in common with the whole world."

"I am very certain they will be handled with courage and wisdom," Mr. Buchan said he was proud to have his name added to Canada's

### Entertainment By L.O.B.A. At Canoe Cove

The Orange Hall at Canoe Cove was completely filled on Wednesday evening for the entertainment given by L. O. B. A. 803. Mr. Neil MacCannell presided and briefly introduced the program of the evening, which consisted of choruses and a dialogue entitled "The Photographer," and an enthusiastic and practical address on "Love, Courtship and Marriage," by Dr. J. W. S. Lowry, who in a humorous and interesting manner spoke of the progressive stages of love-making as the exercise of the supreme passion in human life, and of marriage as an ordinance instituted by God for the happiness and perpetuation of mankind.

The speaker dealt at considerable length with the whole subject of marriage and the home, showing that the institution of the family lay at the basis of church and state, and deplored the fact that, in some communities today the sanctity of marriage was undervalued, if not openly challenged.

In some countries, unsupervised divorce was increasing to an alarming extent and the sweetness and comfort of the home circle was becoming a rarity. Dr. Lowry referred at length to the decrease of marriage among many of the Anglo-Saxon communities, and told of congregations of the Church which were slowly melting away from the decline of places in Canada of which it could really be said that "they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are as the angels of God in heaven." He wished that such communities were more "of the earth earthy," and that proper ideals of the blessed state of matrimony might take possession of their minds. It was the sacred duty and privilege of God and of perpetuate the nation to establish homes in the fear of God and to perpetuate the visible church with an holy seed, according to the commandment of God and the promised blessing.

A very cordial vote of thanks to the speaker was passed on the motion of Daniel MacLean, seconded by Harry MacGavin, for appropriate selection of the choruses, and the proceedings were concluded after a pleasant social hour by the singing of God Save the King.

"I ceased to be a member at 3 o'clock this afternoon," Mr. Buchan smilingly replied.

"I am sorry, sir," said the waiter. "May I congratulate you on your new appointment," he added warmly.

### Young Island Girl Clever Musician

Miss Mary Munn, blind Canadian pianist was greeted by a large and enthusiastic audience Feb. 16th as she appeared in piano recital in the ballroom of the Nova Scotian Hotel.

For some years past Miss Munn has studied under the famous Tobias Matthay, and is now en route to London to continue her work with him. This young pianist, blind from birth and not yet 26 years old, has attained such mature mastery of her art that it is difficult to review her excellent play in brief. She was certainly at home with her favorite piano, a Heintzman concert grand, whose every note responded to her soul. Beginning the program with a suite of pieces by the great J. S. Bach, which was each accompanied to the best traditions, her next Beethoven's "Waldstein Sonata" was fluent and soulful.

Perhaps at the present date Miss Munn's Brahms excels her Beethoven and Brahms is considered difficult to play well. The thoughtful intermezzo in C left us feeling that cheerful one in C left us feeling that we had tasted of the suppers of the Gods.

Chopin's B minor Scherzo, though not on the program was a welcome addition. The E Major-Chopin study was both soulful and brilliant and if the A flat waltz had been a study it could not have gone better. This Chopin Waltz "pulled down" the house, and Miss Munn was obliged to play an encore for which she chose a Schubert-Liszt, "Hark, Hark, the Lark." If Vladimir de Pachmann heard this solo from his celestial seat he must have commanded the young Canadian as we all did. The Sonata by Ravel was Ravel indeed, and the Rhapsody by Dohnanyi, with its clean brilliant octaves concluded the program and forced an encore from the gifted artist. Liszt's "Music Box" was the encore and no one who has heard an old-fashioned music box could mistake this for a picture.

Miss Munn is modest and pleasant of manner and no one realizes better than she that she is still an artist in the making; but we know the material is already well moulded and we therefore look forward to hearing a Canadian Zeltzer by 1945.—Halifax Exchange.

### Father Coady Laid to Rest

(A tribute from Vernon, B.C., taken from Vancouver papers)

Not only St. James' Parish, Vernon, but the whole Archdiocese was shocked at the sudden death of Father Francis Coady, which took place on March 4, after an illness of less than a week. Up until the previous Tuesday, he was enjoying excellent health and was busily engaged in his parish affairs. On that day he entered the Jubilee Hospital from which he seemed a minor complaint but an operation was deemed necessary which, although successful at first, was followed by serious complications which even the powerful physique of Father Coady could not overcome.

Hope, however, was entertained for his recovery until Monday noon, when it was evident that the Master's call had come. The last sacraments were administered and he made ready for the end, which came the same evening.

Father Coady was born in Emyvale, P.E.I. 38 years ago. He left school early and had not the opportunity to resume his studies until some years later, when he entered St. Dunstan's University to make his preparatory course for the priesthood. Here he spent six years, graduating in 1927. The same year he entered St. Augustine Seminary, Toronto, from which institution he was ordained on May 24, 1931, at St. Anne's Church, Lot 65.

He came directly to Vancouver and for a short time was assistant at Holy Rosary Cathedral and at Fernie, going from the latter to Vernon in September of the same year. No words are required to tell of the success of his short pastorate; the devotion in which he was held by his parishioners and the esteem with which he was regarded by all classes are an eloquent tribute to his work as a priest and as a citizen. By his people he was regarded as a true Shepherd and by his brother priests a model of sacerdotal duty, so that his timely passing leaves a gap that will never be filled.

The funeral was held in St. James' Church on Thursday morning, when a Pontifical Mass of Requiem was sung by the Most Rev. Archbishop Duke, of Vancouver, assisted by Father J. C. MacKenzie, as assistant priest, Fathers Besselle and Kane, deacons of honor, Fathers Carroll and Johnson, deacon and sub-deacon of the Mass, and Fathers Monaghan and Steele as Masters of Ceremonies. The funeral sermon was preached by Father W. B. McKenzie. Present in the Sanctuary were Fathers Cote, Collins, O.M.I., Phelan, and Sutherland, O.M.I.

The funeral abolition was imparted by His Excellency, after which the mortal remains of the deceased were laid to rest in the local cemetery. Prayers at the grave were said by Rev. Father Monaghan, cousin of the deceased. The pall bearers were: Messrs. M. J. Courroy, F. De Bono, Y. Allan, R. Chisholm, F. O'Keefe, N. Bessette.

May his soul rest in peace.
