Arabs Close Shops In Haifa

JERUSALEM, July 13.—(AP)—The few Arabs who remain in Haifa today were closed again under death threats as the Holy Land's racial clashes continued. Strife between Jews and Arabs had resulted in approximately 350 dead and wounded since July 5. The identified casualties tonight stood at 31 Arabs and 27 Jews killed; 146 Arabs and 96 Jews wounded.

TO BUILD TOURIST ROADS—Premier Thane A. Campbell announced yesterday negotiations were pending between the Federal and Prince Edward Island governments regarding a \$40,000 federal grant for tourist road projects in this province. The Premier released this information following a visit to Canada's garden province by Resources Minister T. A. Crerar, for the purpose of looking into the tourist traffic possibilities of this province.

Shows Empire's Gain Over Time On Sea And Air

TORONTO, July 13.—(CP)—Rapid development of Empire communications and transport is graphically portrayed in a special display arranged by the government of the United Kingdom for the Canadian National Exhibition opening Aug. 26. The principal exhibit is a large illuminated map of the world indicating how contacts between British companies have been facilitated. This model is an example of the fact that the development of the world tell the story of a striking and vivid manner. The principal Imperial air routes are shown by a special form of illuminated map.

By Sea and Air

The series of ship models starts with an ancient British coracle and ends with a model of the R.M.S. Queen Mary. Among the models is the little Comet, the first vessel to be driven by steam on the Clyde in 1812. There is also a model of the Great Eastern, which was built at Millwall, London, in 1853-8. Propelled by paddle-wheels and a screw propeller, she first crossed the Atlantic in 1861.

The series of motor-car models starts with Gurney's steam coach, the first automobile, or horseless carriage which appeared on the roads between London and Bath in 1827. Two years before the appearance of Stephenson's "Rocket". The models trace the gradual development of automobile design to the present day.

In the airplane model gallery the series begins with some of the early designs for flying machines, which, though most of them never left the ground, are of historic interest. Then follow some of the early gliders, together with Stringfellow's monoplane, the first heavier-than-air, power-driven machine to fly.

Stringfellow demonstrated this machine in Cremorne Gardens, London, in 1849 when his monoplane flew the distance of 120 feet. The series of models continues through every stage of airplane design and ends with some of the most up-to-date machines. Every model in each of the four galleries is accompanied by a descriptive label.

Reunion of Ex-Servicemen TORONTO, July 13.—Plans for a special celebration by "officially" dead, ex-servicemen at the reunion to be held here July 30 to August 1 have been launched.

Decision to hold the special gathering was followed by the submission of the proposal to the Corps reunion committee which reported that no objection could be taken to the plan in view of the fact that the official song of the reunion was "Old Soldiers Never Die." Agreement to the proposal, it was added, was especially favored in the view of the fact that the reunion was to be held during the summer.

James Sheppard, who produced documentary evidence that he had been killed on August 9, 1918, while serving with the Little Black Devils of Winnipeg, was chosen by the committee of three as pro tem president, with official elections to be held during the reunion.

Membership in the group would be restricted, he stated, to men who could produce official documentary evidence that they had been reported killed or "missing, believed to be dead."

"I regularly meet fellows who tell me they thought I was dead and want to know how I can explain my existence," stated Mr. Sheppard. "It's time that all of us who are in this position came to life and did something about it. It's very annoying. We plan to make our own 'road to Wake Up and Live.'"

Paris in Doubt Who is Honored As "First Lady"

(By Gladys K. Arnold, Canadian Press Correspondent) PARIS, July 13.—The coming visit of King George and Queen Elizabeth to France brings out the fact that the wife of the president of France has no official standing. Their Majesties will be here July 16.

Ask anybody in this country who is the "first lady" and you will say not a Frenchman will be found who will answer immediately, "Madame Lebrun." A small netting, another "Mistanguet" (Paris' oldest and most popular music-hall artist), two replies "Madame Curie" and another "Joan of Arc" As for Madame Lebrun's photo, few are to be found outside the family album.

Since the creation of the Republic the role of the president's wife has been one of utter effacement, which seems a little odd in a country where queens and kings' favorites have played such a part in political and cultural destiny.

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Madame Lebrun is a plain person of nothing which would particularly distinguish her in a crowd—for which she is profoundly thankful as she has an aversion to publicity. She is 64, small, straight with graying hair arranged in a neat bun at the back of her head. Her chief charms are her grave smile, her eyes and a simple and kindness of manner which are somewhat old-fashioned.

Parisians who have never yet allowed anyone to occupy a high position without a certain amount of mockery, were not content with her fashion of dress when she came to the Elysées. She had a liking for satins in pale colors which she wore to the Opera. They complained that she lacked a "chic," was a bit contrived and that her dress resembled too closely those of Queen Mary.

Police Active In Corraling Theft Suspects

Yesterday afternoon City Police arrested a man on a charge of being in unlawful possession of stolen goods. It was understood however, that charge of theft would be laid. The arrest followed investigation into the theft of a case of Demerara Black Diamond rum from the Canadian National Railway freight shed Tuesday afternoon. Investigation led to the belief the liquor was concealed in an unoccupied house on the corner of Weymouth and Richmond Streets and a plainclothes constable was left watching the premises. During the afternoon a man was seen entering the house and police raided the place and arrested the man. GOVERNOR RIDES IN WAR CANOE

AUCKLAND, N. Z., July 12.—For the first time in two generations a Governor-General of New Zealand, in full ceremonial uniform, has landed at a Maori village from a Maori canoe, manned by brown-skinned paddlers. This interesting ceremony took place at Ngauruhia, on the Waikato River, when His Excellency Viscount Galway formally opened the richly decorated house, Turono, which has been built as the home of the Maori King, Koroki, and invested Princess Te Pahi Herangi with the insignia of a commander of the Order of the British Empire, awarded to her in recognition of the noble work she has performed for the Maori people.

All the tribes in New Zealand were represented, and there could hardly have been less than 5000 Maoris present, while Europeans in thousands more helped to fill the large open space at the village.

The Vice-Regal party travelled up the Waikato for a distance of nearly a mile in the canoe Te Winika, 66 ft. long, which the famous Maori paddler, Te Whero, has been completely restored and fitted with carved prow and stern-post as of old. The paddlers forced their craft along with rhythmic strokes at an astonishing speed, while a fugleman, in full Maori costume, stood amidships and beat time with his taiaha.

After the investiture and other ceremonies His Excellency cordially greeted Koroki, and the chiefs in the Maori King's entourage were presented.

The last ceremony was the opening of the house by Lord Galway, with a key set in greenstone.
