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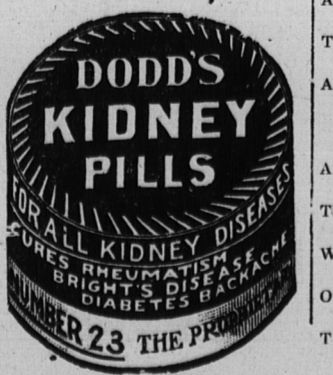

On visiting Victoria one is immediately impressed with the kindness and hospitable way in which the people live and welcome visitors from all parts of the States and Canada of which a number now are the guests of the (Beacon House) R. P. Rogerson, Proprietor, Miss C. B. Lawson, Mrs. Frank E. Johnson and daughter Margaret of Yonkers, N. Y., Mrs. J. B. Jackliffe and two children, Elmer and Jack of Newton, Mass., two Miss Earle, Catherine and Lillian, also the Bank Manager of the Branch of Nova Scotia, J. E. Lutz, Mr. and Mrs. John Saunders and Master Fred of this city.

Miss Clark and Mr. Frank E. Johnson of Yonkers are also expected as guests and a number of the city boys are now camping at the Beacon Shore, namely: Russell Sellars, Roberts Gordon, Malcolm Ross, David Mathieson, Arthur McDonald and Reg. Bell.

Continuing a trip through Crapaud, Tryon and Searletown the visitor, finds the same good feeling prevailing with the best farming districts on the Island, large level farms on all sides with good houses and extra fine out buildings.

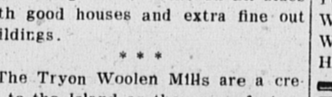
The Tryon Woolen Mills are a credit to the Island as they manufacture underwear, yarn etc., second to none in Canada. The general manager Mr. Lord is always on hand to show visitors through.

Nearby one of the finest Black Fox Ranches on the Island can be seen with eighty black and silver grey foxes managed and reared on the farm of Mr. Henry Smith. Further on one passes through Carleton to Carleton Point where the great Government Works are under construction, which works are certainly wonderful and will be a great boom to the Island Farmers living near or at Carleton Point as they can load cars with produce of all kinds and ship straight through to Upper Canada or any part of United States.

It is here noticed how the farmers have opened up their roads to autos which goes to show they believe in progress and advancement. In a radius of five miles seventeen farmers are owners of autos and may be seen enjoying the evening air after a hard day's work by having a trip in their car.

Fine crops of fall kinds prevail and good prices are booked forward to as reward for their labor.
