world as being behind the times, while we respect the opinions of those who differ with him he thought every member of this legislature should become a leader of thought and should by all honorable means make it their business to show to those who take such strong in their own light.  
Mr. Prowse advised by quoting from a law of 1781 prohibiting horses proceeding at more than walking pace in Charlottetown, and with a man at their head, and said that law was still un repealed.  
MR DENNIS.  
Mr. W. H. DENNIS expressed regret that the two leaders had not got together at the beginning of the session and arranged to avoid controversial subjects while the war lasted. He approved of home gardens, but criticized the Government's attitude on the oyster industry. There was no man had a greater belief in the future of the oyster industry than he. He recognized the difficulties of the Government in legislating for its development but there were many things that might be done to remove the grievances of the fisherman.  
After luncheon Mr. Dennis continued his speech and dealt with the Temperance question and Agriculture along the same lines as previous Opposition Speakers.

HON. LEONARD WOOD.  
Hon. LEONARD WOOD dealt for the most part with the allegations in connection with the hay contracts, and in a vigorous speech denounced the Opposition for having made and circulated charges in regard to the purchases without taking the least trouble to inquire into the facts. He stated there was absolutely no foundation for the statement that the contractors were asked for \$24 per ton. Ten Carvell Bros was accepted for 50c per ton for 1,500 tons. That contract was obtained in advance of \$1 per ton, and on that the contractor made 50c per ton, but still a loss on the 1,500 tons.  
Mr. McLEAN: Were these sub-contracts or given direct?  
Mr. WOOD said they were direct contracts from the representative of the British Government. Other contracts were received at the same figure, and in all 3,224 tons were supplied. The members of the Opposition and the Patriot were wrong in every statement they made in connection with this contract, just as they were in every other charge they made against the Government.  
Mr. McLean had stated that the contractor obtained the hay for \$12 or \$13 per ton. That was not true. They paid \$14 or \$15 delivered at the nearest railway station. They paid railway freight to Charlottetown and the package to the wharf which accounted for another \$1.50 and they paid between \$5 and \$6 for pressing and other expenses in connection with shipment. Where then was the great profit which members of the Opposition alleged in this matter. It was him that there was practically nothing at all in the contract, and that he was prepared to go before a commission or any other enquiry and submit himself and his books for examination. Every statement made by the Opposition and the Patriot on the sub-

ject was false and misleading, and was purposely made to go out and mislead the people in the country. When it became known outside that the hon. gentleman was up people came crowding in till every available space was packed. The hon. gentleman was in great fighting form and did not mince matters.  
Mr. KENNEDY said something had taken place this session that had no parallel in the Legislature before. They had today a Governor who was a Scotchman, the Speaker who was a Scotchman, the mover and seconders were coming to the front here as elsewhere. The debate which was concluded had been fairly interesting. Some of the Opposition members had shown themselves to be bitterly partisan, others were fair and moderate in the expression of their criticisms, such as Mr. Saunders and Mr. Dennis. In politics they could not expect that

everyone would see eye to eye; there must be diversity of opinion; and everyone was entitled to express his views from his own standpoint. But they must not forget that they came in from the country, to do business, and he might say personally that he came in there because the people wanted him to look after their interests, not to waste time in unnecessary talk. It was the duty of a member to carry out the wishes of the people of his district, and the people did not want to have them daily over matters with which they had no concern. They had heard a good deal about the result of the last election and the conclusions to be drawn from it. What was the result of the last election after all? The country had returned the Government to power with a sufficient majority to carry on the business of the country, and at the first by-election they had endorsed that decision by returning the Government Candidate by a record majority. Let them look for a moment at the aggregation which had constituted themselves the Opposition. Who were they, what were their antecedents, who were their leaders and what was their policy? Mr. Bell had been elected their leader at the last moment, but he was not the unanimous choice of the party in the House nor was he recognized as the rightful leader in the country. On the eve of last election a caucus of the Opposition Candidates was held, and Mr. Benjamin Rogers and Mr. George E. Hughes were nominated for leader. (Cries of "oh," and "that has got to do with the matter"). He was taking up that matter to show what the Government was up against today, and to let people in that House and in the country know the history of the Opposition caucus the Opposition selected Mr. Rogers as their leader by a majority of one over Mr. Hughes. They then went to the country under their new leadership and returned leaderless as Mr. Bell was defeated. They then held another caucus, and on that occasion it was a hip-and-high contest between Mr. Hughes and Mr. Bell, and the choice fell upon the latter. This was probably due to the fact that Mr. Bell was long winded, and as there was a by-election on the platform he would be more useful on the platform in getting votes. This choice was a tactical blunder for Mr. Bell had been before the country before and the people in the country had not got such short memories, as some of the caucus seemed to think. He did not want the impression to get abroad that he had any personal bitterness against Mr. Bell. It was not so. He
