Are Attending Important Meeting Of Agriculturists

Messrs. R. C. Parent, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm, D. C. Schurman, assistant to the Superintendent in Field Husbandry and Forage Crops, and Norman Black, supervisor in charge of Illustration Stations are attending the regional convention of the Maritime Branch of the Agricultural Institute of Canada today and tomorrow and a meeting of the Maritime Fertilizer Council on Wednesday at Fredericton, New Brunswick.

Mr. Schurman's Talk

"I believe that under Prince Edward Island conditions it may be better to spend more for nitrogen and potash and less for phosphoric acid. But if we find that a luxury item, the nitrogen might be reduced and the phosphoric acid increased," Mr. Schurman states. He points out that farmers in Prince Edward Island are becoming more pasture conscious and that it is only during the past few years that a study of pasture has been made. "Personally, I found it much easier to answer questions and give advice on pasture management ten years ago than I do today, which shows that I learned a good deal during the ten years."

Feed For The Land

"Among the many factors by which pasture improvement depends, the most important, I believe, is feed for the land. At home, we are a phenomenally good upland pasture that remains in good condition for a number of years. I always have a strong suspicion that at some time that land has received a good coat of manure, whether the owner remembers it or not. One of the best white clover pastures that we ever had followed an application of manure at eight tons per acre on a section of the field where the sod was good, and two

WINNIPEG, July 24 (CP)—Export allocations covering 670,000 bushels of wheat were made to South Africa on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange Saturday. Switzerland took 350,000 bushels. Charlottetown Unit Trains In Ontario

Charlottetown signalmen of the 5th Infantry Divisional Signals Regiment reserve force are this week undergoing their annual summer training at the Royal Canadian School of Signals, Barriefield, Ontario. In the following photos they are shown in the various phases of their training.

Top Dressing of Manure

"In that fifteen tons of good manure put on as a top dressing we applied in theory, at least, approximately 150 lbs. of nitrogen, 75 lbs. phosphoric acid and 150 lbs. potash should be readily available while most of the phosphoric acid would become available only after the organic matter decayed. This application would be equivalent, in plant nutrients to 3,000 lbs. of a 5, 2 1-2, 5 mixture, though in tone of availability and end product it would be difficult to compare. If spread over a period of five years it works out at 600 lbs. of a 5, 2 1-2, 5 per year. But we have not used the composition of manure as a lead. Instead we have spent many years working with mixtures that are relatively high in phosphoric acid—2, 12, 6 for instance. Questions discussed included the methods of liming pastures; how permanent pastures should be reseeded; the lengthened of the pasture season and supplementary pastures, or sowing crops.

Supplementary Pastures

Of these oats alone, oats and sweet clover where sweet clover does well, and clover-alfalfa afterwards. The alfalfa does well in the hay mixture, are the most promising. However, alfalfa has not appeared in the timothy the following year if the aftermath was pastured closely. When we cut clover early for ensiling it has made a remarkably rapid recovery, and supplied a large amount of feed could be either pastured or cut as required and fed as a soiling crop. Sudan grass, either alone or in mixture, millet or sorghum in mixture, are also good. As a standby, a strip of oats and peas on good land—preferably moist land—corn and white turnips proved to be the most promising for use as soiling crops.

Two B. C. Women Enjoy Logging

VICTORIA, B.C., July 24 (CP)—Women may be the weaker sex—but there is nothing weak about Margaret Lowery and Eileen Lowe of Victoria. Tired of indoor life, they hit for the woods to compete with men in the logging business. Twenty-eight-year-old Margaret, and 24-year-old Eileen, know all the tricks of the trade—their fathers were loggers. Early this summer, with the aid of a three-ton truck and a jeep they started snaking logs out of the bush near Prospect Lake. They loaded the logs and hauled them to a local mill. The price of logs is their ability to fill the orders. People still needed firewood so they started cutting their logs into stove lengths. Business was good and they found the market just as large as their ability to fill the orders. Rising at dawn and 12 hours in the sweltering summer heat doesn't faze the girls a bit. Dressed in checked shirts and "jeans" and looking the picture of health, they were interviewed while hard at work. Eileen held the heavy end of the noisy bucking saw while Margaret guided the whirling blade through the three-foot tree. With the perspiration glistening on their faces and grinning happily, they carried on with the cut. It's a tough job even for a man but the girls seem to thrive on it.

Russia Expects Good Harvest

MOSCOW, July 24 (AP)—Russia's 1949 harvest prospects are good, the Central Statistical Administration reported Saturday. June rains benefited a vastly increased acreage of grain and other crops. The statistical agency also announced industrial production was running at 101 per cent but indicated shortages of certain agricultural, electrical and other machinery. Livestock production also was reported up since July 1, 1948. (Russia recently agreed to trade wheat and other grains to Britain for machinery in a proposed new one-year trade agreement. She also has been negotiating for a grain deal with France. She seeks machinery from the West.) The crop announcement reported "good" and "favorable" conditions resulting from the June rains in all important farm areas. The official report went no farther. But it has been announced that there are 15,000,000 more acres under cultivation this year than last, including 4,000,000 additional acres in spring wheat. The industrial report said efforts to meet new targets resulted in a total output for April, May and June exceeding by 20 per cent that for the same period last year. Despite the spurt, however, the agency reported failure to meet the quarter's targets by "certain ministries" responsible for certain products.

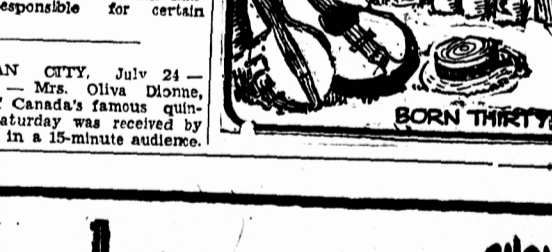

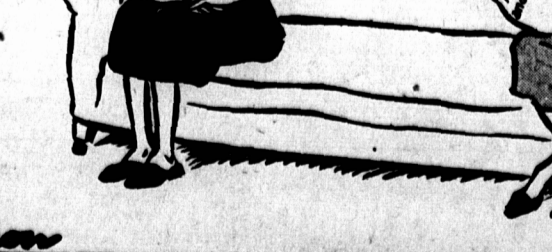
